The jamboree was held in Japan and Libby gave a delightful and entertaining report of her trip – church had supported Libby with a financial contribution for her trip so it was excellent to hear of her adventure.

Minutes of Meeting held 18th March 2015

• The minutes of last year's Annual Parochial Church Meeting had been circulated with the Annual Report. The minutes were proposed by Enid Sedgwick and seconded by Gordon Wood. All agreed.

Matters Arising from the Minutes

• There were no matters arising.

Electoral Roll Report as at 1st March 2016

- Alison Lambert advised that the Electoral Roll at the Annual Parochial Meeting in 2015 stood at 288. Following the revision of the roll for 2016, which closed on 29th February, the number appearing on the Roll is now 292, a net increase of 4 for the year. Which is due to 15 new applications being accepted and 11 names being removed from the list.
- There are still a significant number of church members who are not on the Roll, particularly younger members. Applications for enrolment can be accepted after the conclusion of the Annual Meeting and throughout the year not just at the Annual Revision.

Presentation of the Annual Report for 2015

- The Annual Report for 2015 has been published and distributed in several formats.
- There is a tremendous amount of work that goes on in the church and thanks were given to all those who have contributed their written words to the Annual Report and for all the work that they carry out voluntarily during the year to make Christ Church such a successful church. Thanks were expressed at other times of the year in addition to the annual meeting.
- Formal adoption of the report was proposed by Ken Taylor and seconded by Ken Bellamy and agreed by all present.
- Martin Simmons spoke about the £91,000 grant on the restoration of the organ and purchase of video and screen. The organ has now been removed to Huddersfield until August for renovation. The video and screen have been installed in church. Music workshops and concerts are being organised – please advise if you wish to be involved in the organisation. A film documentation of

the organ restoration is being prepared. A history of people involved in the organ, including the hand blowers, is being prepared. Good progress is being made. The inaugural concert with Nigel Ogden is proposed for 3rd March 2017.

- The Vicar thanked Martin, Vicki and Ken for all the hard work they had put in to secure this grant, which would be of great benefit to many
- Robin Harmar to speak about the feasibility study carried out in respect of the modernisation and improvement of the Church hall, which was originally built in 1923. A grant was obtained to cover the cost of preparing a feasibility study (£10,000) to provide options to update the hall.
- Robin Harmar gave a presentation on the three options and costings. The option that was considered the most useful was to make some structural changes to improve the layout and to make the best use of the available space. This would upgrade the basic facilities to meet modern standards and also make slight alterations. A plan and artistic impressions were shown and Robin explained the proposals the cost to implement this would be £372,000 approximately and, given this high cost, it was proposed that the work be carried out in stages.
- Robin Harmar expressed his thanks to Helen Dickinson and Julie Bourke for running the 200 Club to support the church hall.
- The Vicar expressed his thanks to Robin and Ken for getting the grant to enable the feasibility study to be carried out.

Financial Report & Presentation of the Audited Accounts for year ending 31st December 2015

- Ken Taylor presented the financial report for the year ending 31st December 2015 – full details of the income and expenditure are available in the Annual Report.
- Ken gave details of the highlights of the year planned giving increased by 18%, two major grants received and our Charitable Giving reached a record level £36,807.
- Have achieved a surplus of £4,634 in our general funds, even after our £84,000 freewill offering to the diocese has been paid the balance in our General Fund at the year end was £39,869
- Have achieved a surplus of £38,994 in our restricted funds, which comprise All Saints, the Church Hall, major projects and miscellaneous funds/agency (eg Churches Together account and monies received from services which are paid out to specified charities).
- Details of the Budget for 2016-2017 were given, including advice that our Freewill Offering to the Diocese would increase to £86,040 for this year. It showed a proposed £3,000 in-year surplus.
- 186 members are now part of the planned giving schemes, including 147 who gift aid

- Sheila Levett has relinquished her role as Gift Aid Secretary having worked for 16 years
- Ynez and John Clarke are taking over as GA secretaries and are managing to claim tax back each month
- Ken thanked Helen Dickinson, Jean Goat, Robin Harmar and all the sidespeople for helping to look after the money.
- Ken spoke about easyfundraising.org.uk church has received approximately £270 since 2014 from people who are currently registered online
- The accounts have been signed by The Vicar and have been audited
- The accounts were proposed by Alison Lambert, seconded by Jean Cumbor and all agreed
- The Vicar said a very big thank you to Ken Taylor for all his work on the accounts – he is a very efficient treasurer and carries out his role in what appears to be an effortless manner ! Thanks to Ken and his team who help him.

The Vicar's Comments

- The number of Occasional Offices Baptisms, weddings and funerals, are a good litmus test to how relevant people see the Church in their lives. In 2015 we have 35 Baptisms, 9 weddings and 53 Funerals, with a large increase in weddings for 2016. We endeavour to make every service a positive occasion and include such things as Skype links, Slideshows and recorded music as well as cards and visits for follow up.
- The Vicar thanked the teams involved in all of these services in welcome and follow up, and also acknowledged the good support we enjoy from others in the community who are also involved with the families.• 6% of the Diocesan Budgets comes from weddings and funerals we contributed 27% of the Deanery total from the 10 benefices in the deanery.
- Thanks were expressed to: Little Fishes as it celebrates its 5th birthday; Karen Peverell, Alison Collins who run Sunday School; Claire Sheridan, Linda Banks and Julie Bourke who run The Firm. Those involved with 'Who let the dads out'; The Come and Praise team and also to those who work to prepare special services, eg Love in a Box,
- We had a successful confirmation with candidates including two brides from Newton under Roseberry church who came to be confirmed by Bishop Paul and many other successful activities.
- Attendance figures vary and our average attendance is slowly declining due to deaths but we are still a very healthy church
- Our Church reaches out to the community in many ways, including the regular Foodbank collections, support for charities, village events and through Spire.

- The Vicar expressed thanks to Sheila Levett, who has retired as Gift Aid Secretary and welcomed John and Ynez Clarke who have taken over, and Michael Aisbitt, who has joined us as our new organist and choirmaster.
- Enid Sedgwick, John Dickinson and The Vicar attended the LYCIG conference giving ideas on how we can grow our church.
- The Vicar thanked all the parish staff who help and go about their tasks faithfully and without fuss.
- The Vicar expressed thanks to Archbishop Sentamu who was the icing on the cake.
- Christ Church could not be such a vibrant and lively church without all contributions and the Vicar thanked everyone .
- On behalf of all members of the church, Martin Simmons thanked Paul for everything he does for us, for his spiritual leadership and for his initiative in leading our church into growth we will be behind you.

Stokesley Deanery Synod

In 2016 the Parish was represented by Nick Land and Rosemary Wheway. There are two vacancies. The clergy and readers also attend.

There were four meetings in 2016 in various venues in the Deanery. Apart from the business of information sharing and financial necessities each meeting began with an informative talk and any member of the congregation can attend the talk and stay as an observer for the business meeting.



In February we had a presentation by Ailsa Adamson who is the Project Manager for the Methodist Asylum Project (MAP). Middlesbrough has been chosen by the Government as an area to locate Asylum Seekers because of its cheap and available suitable housing. There is a Drop-in Centre in Linthorpe which will be grateful to receive household goods and clothing.

In June the Ven Sam Rushton spoke about developing a Deanery Strategy and following on from this there was an additional meeting in November to hear a presentation by members of the Diocesan Developing our Deaneries Working party.

In October we heard about the visit to the Diocese of False Bay in 2015 by Bishop Paul and the Revd's Angela Bailey and Pauline Percy.

Each year the Deanery organises four Lent services. In 2016 these were held in Stokesley Parish Church and had four excellent speakers :- Ven Sam Rushton Archdeacon of Cleveland, Sister Anita of the Order of the Holy Paraclete, Rev Alison Wilkinson Methodist Minister and Mgr David Hogan Nunthorpe RC Church. Each session ended with a short act of worship.

CHURCHWARDENS' REPORT

During 2016, as well as general maintenance to the fabric of Christ Church, All Saints Church and the Church Hall, the pipe organ has been restored

and by David Wood of Huddersfield. An HLF grant has enabled us to complete this work - the installation of multimedia equipment, production of a film and publicity material of the organ's history. We look forward to a series of workshops and concerts over the coming three years, the first in March when Nigel Ogden will perform on the organ. A new electric blower recently purchased will enable the organ to be played to its full potential.



2016 saw many special occasions. As well as the Great Ayton Remembers WWI commemorations throughout the year, we also marked the Queen's 90th birthday and welcomed the Tour de Yorkshire through our village where we held our Praise and Party afternoon service complete with blue and yellow decorations. Services for families, both on Sundays and during the week still flourish and grow. We have successfully moved the Hollygarth monthly service for our slightly more mature members of the congregation to the Coffee Lounge, where it has become 'Communion and a Cuppa'. They very kindly brought their comfortable chairs with them, a benefit to all users of the lounge.

We were pleased to see four new RPAs licensed in September and welcome them to work alongside Rosemary in various positions within that role. We were also delighted in November to mark the 25 years that Margaret Lewis has served as reader, a great achievement.

We must thank the congregation for their support and hard work during the last year without which the life in our church would be so much poorer in every way. Special thanks also go to our vicar Paul supported by Geoff, Jon, Margaret and Peter for their leadership and hard work. With Paul now responsible for Nunthorpe Parish as well we will do our best to support him through 2017 and the challenges ahead.

Financial Report 2016

After the intensive fundraising over the past 2 years, 2016 settled down to a period of consolidation financially. Overall, income in our unrestricted funds was almost balanced by the expenditure for the year. This left our reserves at £39,494, much the same as last year.



Unrestricted income increased slightly from $\pounds 141,004$ last year to $\pounds 144,087$. The main factor contributing to this increase was

the substantially higher level of donations this year ($\pounds 13,217$ compared with $\pounds 7,572$ last year). Many of these were $\pounds 500$ or over and appeared to be in response to Paul's appeals in Spire. Fee income rose again this year due to the increase in the number of weddings held in Christ Church. We again took full advantage of the Gift Aided Small Donations Scheme (GASDS) which allowed us to collect an additional $\pounds 5,000$ in tax rebates from loose collections.

Unrestricted expenditure increased from £136,420 in 2015 to £144,462 this year. A major source of unplanned expenditure was the need to replace the organ blower, which was found to be significantly under-powered after the organ restoration. Fortunately, the cost (£6,100) was covered by the increased level of donations (referred to above). During the year we completed a major programme of repairs to the church stonework and the drainage system around the church at a cost of £3,600. The PCC agreed to increase our contribution to the Diocesan Common Fund to £86,040, roughly in line with inflation. Elsewhere our operating costs were generally in line with the budget.

We again donated $\pounds 10,000$ to mission giving from general funds. Following last year's practice of encouraging recommendations from members of the PCC, we were again able to identify several new beneficiaries this year, all of whom responded with warm and heartfelt letters of thanks

Collections from baptisms were again donated to three children's charities- Zoe's Place, Daisy Chain and CLIC Sargent- the choice of charity being made by the parents. We were pleased to welcome the nationally-acclaimed folk singing duo, Megson, to Christ Church - the concert raised over $\pm 1,200$ for Open Door North East.

During the year we ran three major appeals. Our Easter appeal raised £440 for the work of the Barnabas Fund. while, at Harvest, we supported the Middlesbrough Food Bank; in addition to the usual food parcels, donations totalling £285 were

received to help with their operating costs. For our Christmas appeal we again supported School Aid India. Its founder, Helen Jones, gave us a progress report on the work being carried out to replace the wooden classroom which had been destroyed by the effects of the serious earthquakes 2 years ago. It is very gratifying to record that the appeal raised nearly \pounds 4,000 which, together with the collection raised at St Oswalds, Newton, will allow the rebuilding work to be completed.

Overall, our mission giving from funerals and weddings, special services, appeals, and donations from general funds reached the excellent total of \pounds 31,371 distributed among a record 56 different charities.

Our organ restoration project proceeded well during the year with expenditure on the organ, and purchase of a new motorised screen and projector reaching a total of £82,235 all of which was funded from the grant secured last year from the Heritage Lottery Fund.

The Church provided a grant of $\pounds 2,000$ to help fund the repairs caused by subsidence under the serving hatch in the Church Hall. The finances of All Saints remain stable with maintenance costs being met largely from donations from visitors and special services.

And finally to all those who help to manage the church money - John & Ynez Clarke, Helen Dickinson, Jean Goat, Robin Harmar and the sidespeople – a huge thank you to you all!

All Saints Church

A fairly quiet, uneventful, year in the life of All Saints, though I am pleased to report that visitor numbers held up at around 1200, the same as 2015, despite there being fewer guides and in the face of the difficult economic climate. Equally box donations surprisingly increased.

Even though guide numbers were again reduced, the coverage of duties actually improved compared to 2015. This is mainly due to a couple of volunteers – you know who you are – who take on extra duties, but to maintain a credible seven afternoons per week opening we undoubtedly need more guides.



After two years as a guide and rota organiser Charles Jeans has left the area but we are fortunate to have Jennifer Roberts back as his replacement.

During the summer months I had the offer of some help from a local ex-serviceman's support organisation and a small group came along on two occasions, carrying out valuable tasks such as cleaning the big windows and tidying up the area around Rev'd Ibbotson's grave. It is not clear whether this resource will again be available in 2017.

As usual the All Saints year ended on a high with the candlelit Carol Service. To see the church full and experience the vibrant atmosphere reminded us that this is a living church, a truly spiritual place and an important asset to the community.

Safeguarding

Post the "Jimmy Savile Affair", the general public have become more aware of Safeguarding (the protection of children under 16, and of vulnerable adults). Likewise, the Church of England has increased its vigilance in all Safeguarding matters.



Posts have been created within the Diocese of York with

people to explain the new legislation for dealing with Safeguarding issues, and a series of training sessions are to be implemented.

An "awareness" level will soon be available on line which is for all people with an interest in Safeguarding, and includes sidespeople, greeters and coffee makers at Church Services or activities. The next level (C1) will include, among others, PCC members, Church visitors, leaders and helpers at Church activities and Services. These training sessions will last approximately two hours and will be held in the Church Hall, hopefully during April 2017. More details will follow as they become available.

Christ Church Visitors

We are currently a group of 18 who visit 27 people on a regular basis helping make a difference to their lives and spiritual growth. There are more housebound and/or elderly people in our parish who would benefit from this service so more volunteers are always welcome. Some



Visitors have also made contact with people for a short time, for instance following a stay in hospital, until someone is able to return to church.

We meet regularly with the clergy so that they can monitor our visits and we review our guidelines annually. We had training sessions about Dementia Friendly Churches and the problems of Loneliness. Our aim is to visit anyone in the village in need – the housebound, lonely, sick and infirm – but this does not exclusively mean those who are regular churchgoers. We visit people mostly in their own homes but several of those visited eventually move out of the village to Care Homes and our Visitors travel as far as Catterick and to Stokesley, Middlesbrough and Guisborough to stay in touch. They also visit hospitals where appropriate.

The group supports the monthly and Christmas Coffee Lounge services and also transports some of the people who would otherwise be unable to attend. These are open to **anyone** who appreciates a weekday afternoon service.

In 2016 we hosted our fifth Praise and Party service followed by tea in the Hall. This attracted many for whom the 9.15 service is just too early. It was on the afternoon of the Tour de Yorkshire and we continued the theme. We hope to host a similar event in 2017. We took a selection of food after the party to 13 who were unable to attend. This was warmly welcomed.

We continue to deliver cards on the first anniversary of a bereavement and also a Welcome Pack whenever we see a removal van in the village.

These are very rewarding tasks and we would welcome more Visitors so that we can extend our visits to more people. Please tell us if you know someone who would like a visit or you have new neighbours but more importantly **join us if you can! Rosemary Wheway**

Prayer

During the past year there have been some new opportunities to deepen our prayer life together at Christ Church. So what opportunities were there for this to happen? The simple prayer pattern, which Archbishop Sentamu taught throughout the diocese of York during his pilgrimage of prayer, witness and blessing, has become a regular part of the prayer life of a group who now gather in church on Friday mornings from 9.00 - 9.30am and 8.00 - 8.30pm during the summer months of July and August. Come join us in this pattern of prayer at any of the group times, which are notified via the church news sheet.

During Lent our vicar Paul used a book "5 things to pray for your church". Use of the book spread to a larger prayer circle who used it as a focus for prayer together until Pentecost. There were four excellent speakers at Stokesley Parish church also during Lent, each providing much food for thought and prayer, in their talks from their own faith journey.

Leading up to Pentecost our Archbishops' prayer for evangelism called for throughout the church. Occasions were organised in the various churches in our Deanery so that we could visit each other for prayer time together. Here at Christ Church some of our younger adults set up Prayer Stations in church in the days before Pentecost so that people could church for prayer come into and reflection in their own time. Several people commented that they really appreciated this. Also, a prayer station on the Fruits of the Spirit was set up in Christ Church during the summer months.



In September a 'Prayer Tree' was used during the 9.15 service drawing together prayers linked to Creation. When the Memory Tree was dismantled after Christmas, Paul led a short time of prayer and reflection together.



The Contemplative prayer group has continued to meet for prayer weekly and has organised two well attended, much appreciated mornings of prayer, led by two very different characters – Father Kevin from Ampleforth Priory and Rev. Nicholas Buxton from Newcastle. The venue for both these mornings was the Friends Meeting House.

Bible Study Group

This year we changed the format of the group in order to attract new members. We had a number of very interesting discussions based on the 'Nooma' DVDs. One particularly interesting presentation was on the importance of forgiving other people for the hurt they have done us (as we are forgiven by God). Another was examining what it meant to be a disciple of Jesus and understanding the full significance of what it meant for his disciples (and us) when he says "follow me". We also made use of the new church projection system for a well-attended discussion looking at a film which suggested how the poetic form of the creation story and modern physics could be looking at God's creative work from different but complementary angles.

Little Fishes

We celebrated our 200th Little Fishes in February! Over the last six years attendance has grown to an average number of fifty on a regular basis – twenty four Fishes and twenty seven adults. As you would expect it is very lively!



A big change this year is the introduction of new technology, with a screen show as people arrive and then using the screen for prayers, notices et c to encourage more participation but the basic format of the service in church stays the same to enable people to remain familiar with it. We also welcomed John Dickinson and Christine Smailes to the team so we now have more people to tell stories which is always a popular part of the service. Marilyn Walker and Jan Thompson have also joined the dedicated team of helpers who provide refreshments, another important part of the morning! Twice a year there is

a get-together for the whole team for fellowship and lunch.

It is encouraging to see that a number of Fishes regularly attend Who Let the Dads Out? and also the monthly Come and Praise service. Children attending Little Fishes range in age from three months to four years, mostly from Great Ayton but also from as far afield as Redcar and Yarm. As children grow older there will always be a turnover as Little Fishes leave to attend nursery and school but there is, of course, no age limit for adults so anyone is welcome to attend at 9.30am on Tuesdays in term time. We give out birthday cards on Little Fishes' birthdays and also Christmas cards to families. Once again the toy stall at the Church Coffee Morning was very popular; lots of toys were donated and sold with plenty of help on the day.

So from small beginnings this outreach to the wider community has certainly "mushroomed". We need to constantly keep in touch with our attendees and be aware of any changes that may enhance the worship. Long may this winning formula continue to spread the gospel and encourage friendship and worship.

Sunday School Report

We meet every Sunday during term time school except for the 2^{nd} Sunday of the month when it is Family Service at 11am. We have over 30 children on the register with an average attendance of around 20. A good number of parents help on the rota

Activities are available from 9am for early arrivals. We start with a service. The children take turns lighting the altar candles, we change the colour of the cloth as in Church to teach the children about Church colours and seasons. The service continues with our weekly story, prayers, the peace and singing. We finish with a craft activity linked to the story we have told. The children go into Church for the end of the



service and show their crafts and tell the congregation what they have learnt.



We have followed the Lectionary with our stories at Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter and Harvest. We have studied many other bible stories too. On Good Friday we had around 70 children attend the craft workshops. The children produced some lovely crafts and were joined by their families for a short service in Church.

We participated in the special services for Love in a Box and Christingle.

Always the highlight of the year 'The Crib Service'. This year we had 30 children taking part singing some lovely songs and telling the Christmas Story accompanied by Hannah Peverell on the piano.

We would thank the PCC for their continued financial support which allows us to do interesting crafts and run special events for the children, and Peter Lofthouse whose kind support is always appreciated.

Church Hall Report

We are very blessed in having such a terrific team to look after the administration, cleaning and upkeep of both the church hall and coffee lounge. Thank you so much Sarah, Anne, Tabby and Phil for all that you do, you are very much appreciated. We are indebted to Helen and Julie who run the 200 club so competently and to all of you that contribute to this scheme, it



really does helps us balance the books. Many thanks to the PCC and especially Ken for giving us a grant this year, thus keeping our finances in a healthy state. Finally can I thank all of you that use the hall for whatever reason, it's a pleasure to see it well used by so many from both the church and from the wider community.



This last year has seen many improvements, not least the repair of the sloping serving hatch into the hall. Very rotten joists were discovered under the floor, a long standing leak from the drain of the nearby sink was the probable cause. The lowering of the work surface has I believe met with widespread approval. The next stage of this work should see improvements to the bar side of kitchenette with the the installation of new worktops and,

should finances allow, a glass washing machine under the bar. Soon after Christmas 2015 the coffee lounge roof nearly blew off in a gale so severe that it also damaged the chancel roof on the church. We were delighted that our insurance company agreed to cover the cost of a new roof which was installed in the summer. A drain survey was completed, this found that the outlet from the men's toilet in the hall was blocked by roots growing in the drain. A leak in the ladies toilet in the hall was

finally repaired, we hadn't realised that the floor sloped so spent several months looking for a leak on the wrong toilet! Such is life!

Following on from the feasibility study completed early in the year we decided to hold meeting to discuss our future plans. All organisations and other interested individuals were invited to hear about our rather ambitious project. An application was submitted to the National Lottery for funds but unfortunately they did not agree to support us. So what's next? It has become abundantly clear from discussions over this past year that any improvements should first centre around the hall kitchen and all toilets. Over the coming months it is hoped that plans will be drawn up for these improvements. It is still our intention to seek funds from grant awarding bodies, though on a smaller scale than we first envisaged, so that the work can go ahead. We will keep people informed of developments on this front as the year progresses.

Worship

Come & Praise This form of worship enables those with young families to worship in a relaxed environment; it's an important stepping stone especially for those for whom more traditional worship is a step too far. It also attracts a number of older members of our church who enjoy, a little bit, the informality. We meet on the 2nd Sunday each month (except November) plus held specials on Mothering Sunday & Easter Day.

One of our highlights of 2016 was in August when our service was based on our Prayer Station theme 'Fruits of the Spirit'. Our storyteller, Lesley Miller, devised a 'fruits picnic' and got the children to select a fruit to go with each of the Galatians fruits – love, joy, peace, patience, kindness,

goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and selfcontrol. It was so stunning that we repeated it at our Parish Eucharist the following week (with the aid of video projection onto the big screen).

"Great Big God" or "Walking for the Lord" are our regular links for 'Little Fishes' to feel at home. Whilst our music often comes courtesy of digital technology it is great to welcome Paul Fussey and others playing real instruments on occasion – musical volunteers always welcome!



8am Holy Communion Our Book of Common Prayer Communion early on a Sunday morning attracts 20+ worshippers each week who enjoy this quiet, more reflective service which uses the language of the Book of Common Prayer. It was interesting this year to see one of our wedding couples who needed to attend to qualify made this their service of choice. We are thankful for such a willing and friendly congregation, which has grown since several members of Nunthorpe Church joined us when their 8am service was discontinued.

9.15am Parish Communion Our Parish Communion remains the main act of worship still attracting 100 plus worshippers each Sunday, and we also welcome in our Sunday School during term time. The Choir are there every week to lead singing and add anthems, and we enjoy a variety of preachers. When the Church Parade joins us we now go to a non Eucharistic Format to make the service shorter so the young people can attend before all the Sunday morning activities begin. Our service always concludes with Coffee in the Coffee Lounge.

Sunday Evening Specials Although not having a regular Sunday evening service any more, we do enjoy many specials throughout the year including Memorial Services, Songs of Praise, Love in a Box, Christingles and several Carol Services. Village fun was joined in with when the Tour de Yorkshire went through Great



Ayton. A special hymn was sung to *Daisy, Daisy* and after our service we went into the Hall for a super tea. We also share some Sunday evenings with other Churches in the village for such occasions as Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, Easter, Pentecost.

Christenings/ Baptisms On many Sundays we also have a Christening Service, welcoming the newly baptised into the life of the Church. We tend to do these as standalone services, for the number of guests now attending Christenings can often be 80+ - too many to include in an early Parish Communion. We pass on invitations to all baptism families to





Little Fishes, Who Let the Dads Out and Come and Praise. We had 22 Christening in Christ Church or All Saints last year, and my thanks go to the team who support these services and give a welcome.

Weddings We saw a bumper number of 17 weddings in Christ Church in 2016 with a blessing service at Angrove

Park and a further 23 weddings at Saint Oswald's Church at Newton under Roseberry, so it was a very busy summer. New to our weddings in Christ Church was the option for a slideshow of



photos to music during the signing of the registers. This proved both popular and moving, and was greatly appreciated. We get lots of very kind messages after weddings that show people very much enjoy their experience with us. Many thanks to the team of Alison & John - Vergers; Michael and Chris -Organists: Elsa & the bell ringers: Jackie Gough - Leven Flowers. We have a great team.



Funerals In the towns, many people are turning to civil celebrants for funerals, but I am pleased to say that isn't the case in Great Ayton where people still primarily turn to the Church for such occasions. Not only can we offer a far better service on the day, including extras such as recorded music, slideshows on our large screen, live Skype links etc at no extra charge, we also follow up with visits and Memorial Services. Asking for the vicar instead of a celebrant, also puts money into maintaining the Church of England rather than just in paying a person on the

day. Last year we had 23 funerals in Church and 21 straight to the crematorium. Again, we work with an excellent team in the village, with our ever reliable verger Alison, Michael Rea our incredibly efficient village Funeral Director amongst others in the area, Jan Alderson who does the best funeral teas in the area (And here I am an expert!) Jackie Gough from Leven Flowers who does stunning arrangements; and Howard Atkinson the cemetery superintendent who has kept the village cemetery looking so good and is always so friendly and helpful. Thank you to all, and we shall miss Howard when he retires in April 2018.

Once again I thank all the leaders new and 'old' for their time and commitment to Guiding not just in our Brownie Unit but in many other roles too.


