A Word from the Vicar



The 2020s are proving to be a Decade of changes that we could never have imagined. It started with Covid and Lockdowns. I still can't believe that clergy were actually forbidden to enter their Churches for 3 months and that it would be 18 months before we sang as a congregation again in Church. Those who encourage us to healthy life styles tell us that do anything for 3 months and you have developed a new habit/ routine. We have

certainly seen that as we are still seeing numbers creep back upwards since Covid ended. The litmus test for Church was the restarting of Concerts last year at All Saints and Christ Church with audiences enjoying the experience. The "Conspiracy Theory" of Covid being created in a Lab in Wuhan is now mostly accepted as fact - Batman is innocent after all! What other "facts" will prove to be false.



Last year also saw the magnificent achievement of our beloved Queen celebrating her Platinum Jubilee. The scenes on the Mall of respect and love for her were very



moving, and I know from taking our "Queen" on a visit around the village just how highly Aytonians thought of her. We celebrated in style with a wonderful display in Christ Church and a moving service followed by cake, wine and loyal toast. To hear just a few months later that she had died was a shock, although we all knew the day would come. Her funeral service brought the world together, with it being the biggest viewing audience

worldwide ever. For many of us she has been the only monarch that we can remember, and her example of faithfulness and service commanded huge respect. What would happen when she was gone. That their would be forces unleashed to undermine the monarchy was expected, but the biggest disappointment was seeing the charge led by a member of her own family, but it's not just a family altercation for the monarchy is interwoven throughout British Society and the Commonwealth, holding is together. In an ever changing and challenging world we need unity more than ever before.



On the 24th February we saw war begin in Europe as Russia invaded Ukraine, and that bloody conflict has now claimed hundreds of thousands of lives, destroyed cities and made millions refugees. It's easy to point the finger at President Putin and Russia, and they haven't helped by the manner they have conducted the war, with murder, rape and torture used as weapons, but I guess that if this conflict is like any others, it's likely that this won't be one sided. As with Covid, we need open minds, remembering words of Senator Hiram Johnson in WWI "The first casualty, when war comes, is the truth.

In the midst of these changes and challenges, Christ Church has continued proclaiming God's love, both in word and deed.

We have supported Middlesbrough Foodbank and The Genesis Project at Grove Hill, visited the lonely & housebound, and comforted the bereaved, supported charities and Church organisations with over £34K as well as generous support for the Diocese with £91,440 Freewill Offer. There's been outreach to the young with Little Fishes and Sunday School, and the welcome return to Church Parades of the Uniformed Organisations. Marwood C of E School restarted half termly services in Church in addition to the weekly assemblies taken by myself at school, and it was great to be welcomed back to both Roseberry Academy and Ingleby Greenhow School. Marwood School also celebrated their recent Ofsted Inspection with "Good with Outstanding Qualities", and my thanks to our Foundation Governors - David Fox and Vicky Bradley for their input. Vicky kindly stepped in to be Chair of Governors after I stood down after 27 years in the role.

Attendance at Services has continued to grow on Sundays, although we are not yet back to 2019 levels. However, we are still streaming our Sunday Service on Facebook and Zoom, and have another congregation there. Our Daily Prayer for the Day celebrated 1,000 consecutive days in December, and we have a very faithful Zoom team who lead each weekday following Olwen's musical start to each service. Last year we also formalised Andrew Blair's role as our Organist and Choirmaster and we are delighted to have him with us. Cafe Church also continued to grow, and thanks to Nick and Jane who lead it, and Helen for such a plentiful supply of delicious cakes.



Spiritual life has been nurtured through many groups that have met to study together throughout the year - Discipleship Groups, Lent Groups and the Confirmation Class, and huge thanks to all who lead them. We have also moved ahead respecting the creation with the work of Eco Church, championed by Geoff.



Last year saw 26 Baptism, 7 Weddings 56 Funerals (half of which had services in Church), 7 Confirmed, 153 Easter Attendance, 282 Christmas Eve & Day and a return to good attendances at all our Christmas Carol Services, apart from the Schools Carol Service which had



to be cancelled due to icy roads.

Our Church Hall is also buzzing hosting many community activities, 3 badminton groups, Guiding Groups, Pantos, Plays and lots of parties. Members of the Church are also involved in other Community activities and causes like the Discovery Centre.



In November the community once again gathered in large numbers for Remembrance Sunday, and the display last year was especially poignant with the History Society preparing biographies for all 48 men who lost their lives in the First and Second World Wars. This display attracted much attention as we saw that these were young men with families whose future had been taken away from them. Sadly we learn nothing and Ukrainian and Russian

families will be doing the same.

A good year for Christ Church, so many thanks to the great team who help make it so - our Churchwardens and Church Officers, PCC Members, Leaders of Organisations and Activities, all who assist on Sundays in every ways, our Parish staff who also help out at other Churches - especially Stokesley and Grove Hill - and to all our hidden heroes that come in when no one else is there to clean, tidy and decorate. Thank You all.

We have a new Vice Chair in Robin who took over from Rosemary. Mary Mason, as our Safeguarding Officer is very well informed and efficient. She makes sure everything is kept up to date, including PCC Members' training and DBS checks. We had a Safeguarding Sunday where Jane and Mary gave an overview to the congregation of what it takes to ensure we are a safe Church.

The PCC have to make sure the money that the Church receives is spent as wisely but as generously as possible. Our Treasurer, Ken, gives us a report each meeting and explains how the finances are faring. This helps us in our decisions regarding repairs, renewals and our Giving.

We have discussed how best to keep the Services as open as possible to all with the Vicar guiding us we made decisions regarding making the Services as normal as they used to be. We took into consideration the fact that some people are still vulnerable and worried about catching Covid, they should feel safe in Church.

Some families have commitments on a Sunday morning, Nick and Helen have opened a Service on a Sunday afternoon, Cafe church, which is well attended. 2 Welcome – the Vicar welcomed us all with a Prayer and silent Prayer. We said The Lord's Prayer together. We especially remembered the people of Ukraine and prayed for peace.

3 Election Of Churchwardens - Jonny and Helen had filled in nomination forms. Both were elected for a further year. The Vicar thanked them on our behalf for all the hard work they'd done. We welcomed them back into their roles.

5 Minutes of last meeting 17 March 2021 – Proposed Jonny W, Seconder, Ken T. Minutes accepted as a true record.

6 Matters Arising from Minutes – None

7 Electoral Roll Report – Vicki reported that there are currently 214 members on roll.

8 Presentation Of Annual Report For 2021

The Vicar informed us that the previous year hadn't had a lot going on because of lock down so reports were sparse, however, this year with a lot more meetings and events and Church becoming more busy, people made up for it with more detailed reports. It made for a very optimistic document. It showed us there are far more people than we realise involved in the various groups around the Church. Proposed Mrs Mary Mason, Seconder Mr Peter Titchmarsh. Accepted Annual Report 2021 as a true record. The Vicar thanked everyone involved in running things etc. and expressed his hope that things will keep improving.

9 Financial Report And Presentation Of Audited Accounts For Year Ended 31 December 2021 – (Circulated in Annual Report)

Paul invited Ken to explain a little about the finances. Ken, sharing the screen, hi-lighted the steady recovery from the lock down. There are more weddings and other Services happening in Church. Planned Giving is slightly down (£5000), Charitable Giving has increased slightly. Regarding General Funds, the income budgeted for and the actual totals almost agree. There was a grant and a legacy so the income is what we expected.

We reviewed our Mission Giving and Free Will to Diocese. We reduced Diocese payment by £3000 and Mission Giving by £2000. There is a list in the Annual Report of all the Christian charities which received help. Reserves are now at £34,000. which has enabled us to keep enough funds in the Church to run for three months, which is the legal requirement. We will review the Giving next year to try to increase payments. We were helped by the government payments and an offer of over £1000 to change banks. Restricted funds now has a balance of £18000.

Geoff asked about the numbers for standing order payments etc. Ken explained there are 142 people and 25 people in the envelope scheme. Ken thanked Helen, Robin, Inez, John and Jean for their help in gathering the amounts. He also thanked members of the Church for their generous giving.

Robin informed us that the Church Hall total is about £3000 more than it would have been but for an insurance claim which hasn't been spent yet. Balance is £6406.

All Saints finances are kept separately from the rest. Currently there is £1,675 *(Couldn't see either screen clearly, is this total correct?)*

Paul thanked Ken for his time and hard work and we showed our appreciation in an applause.

10 The Vicar's Comments – After discussions at previous PCC meetings, Mary Mason was appointed as Safeguarding Officer, taking over from David Fox.

Paul had set up a slide show illustrating the year's events and reports. It was lovely to watch and showed us all the positive things that have started to emerge in 2021, continuing into 2022.

Paul gave thanks to all the Parish staff, we agreed that we are very fortunate to have them. They help in other areas, St Chad's, St Oswald's and at Stokesley. He also thanked the PCC Minute taker, Frances. She is happy to help unless some one more efficient would like to take over the role.

Rosemary has spent a lot of of years as Vice Chair, previously she has been Churchwarden. She decided to give the role over to someone else but is happy to continue as a PCC member. Paul presented her with a lovely bouquet of flowers to thank her.

Regarding 'Living Christ's Story' Paul explained about the Deanery Plan, to which John Dickinson is part of the team, to encourage us to be more Christ Like. We are encouraged to grow our numbers and lower our age profile. We are lucky at Christ Church in that we do have young people and families who are involved and play an important part in the Church.

We would like to continue with our generosity in supporting poorer parts of the Diocese and we still have to get our Christian message out there. Paul shared on screen 'Our Deanery Life' We need more help with things that we do well to give a better outcome. In future, we will look at a couple of items at each PCC meeting from the list shared. It will be a challenge for the year.

Mr Ken Taylor proposed that we use the company AZETS, Mr John Gresham, to act as the Independent Examiner. The Committee agreed.

12 Any Questions - Jonny took this opportunity to thank Paul on the PCC's behalf for all his hard work and patience in bringing us through the pandemic and throughout the year. His positive and optimistic attitude helped keep everyone's spirit and hope up, even though he was probably experiencing worse events than most of us.

This part of the meeting closed at 8.30pm and we all said The Grace together.

Churchwardens' Report

Since the last AGM we have continued to meet in person for worship at our regular Sunday Services in church at 8am and 9.15am with the services returning to the normal "pre-covid" pattern. The 9.15am service continues to be transmitted by zoom and Facebook. Cafe church meets in the church hall every 2nd and 4th Sunday at 4pm, led by Nick Land, Jane Robson and Steve Green. Weekday services - Holy Communion on Wednesday at 10am, and coffee lounge Communion on the first Monday at 2pm, are also well attended. Prayer for the Day (8.45am via zoom and Facebook) continues to be a blessing to people, both from our own church and other churches near and far.



Our LED lighting project to update and improve the church lighting, and reduce our carbon footprint was completed in February, and this has been very successful in improving the lighting, as well as reducing our electricity costs. Thank you to Robinsons from Knaresborough for carrying this out effectively and with minimum disruption. All lighting in all areas of the church building is now LED. Damp is affecting the south west corner of the church and this is currently being assessed. All the external doors were painted in the summer. In December we were offered a reduced rate to resurface the driveway as the council had some spare hot bitumen. As we were planning to do this, we jumped at this opportunity, saving several thousand pounds! We are continuing with general maintenance, and this year our quinquennial report will be carried out.

We have checked that the church silver and other items of value are kept safely.

There is a large group of people working behind the scenes week by week to enable our church to function, and we are very grateful to everybody who helps. This group includes our sidespeople, volunteer cleaners, flower arrangers, and the coffee team. New people have joined these teams, serving God and our church community. We all have a role to play in the functioning of our church - please consider prayerfully what you could contribute.

We thank God for His continued blessings, enabling us to fulfil His ministry here in Great Ayton.

REVIEW OF FINANCIAL ACTIVITIES AND AFFAIRS



2022 was a year which saw the church make further steady progress towards “normal “operation after the effects of the Covid pandemic. Covid restrictions were largely removed and numbers attending the various services returned to near pre-Covid levels.

Our financial position continued to recover with planned giving increasing from £82,385 in 2021 to £84,695 in 2022. We were the fortunate recipients of three legacies totalling £15,500 and general donations to the Church reached the record high of £11,554- this sum included 7 donations of £500 or over. St Oswald’s church in Newton kindly made a donation of £1000 towards our clergy and service costs. In addition, we received grants from the Diocese to support the operating costs of our curate and to assist us with the escalating energy costs. Fees from funerals and weddings also showed an increase over 2022. Overall, our unrestricted income increased from £123,277 in 2021 to £154,246 this year compared to the budget of £131,600- a very satisfactory result

Owing to the loss of we made last year, and the uncertainties surrounding the effects of Covid, we budgeted for a lower Freewill Offer to the Diocese of £91,440 which was paid in full. We also reduced our mission giving from general funds to £8,000 from £10,000 the previous year. The project to upgrade the church lighting system was completed with £2,196 being required from general funds to supplement the fundraising effort. The opportunity was also taken to have the front carpark re-surfaced at a cost of £2,500. Overall, the unrestricted expenditure increased from £131,635 in 2021 to £138,189 this year leaving a surplus for the year of £16,057, a position made possible by the unbudgeted legacies and grants received during the year

We ran several appeals during the year. In March we raised £3,165 to support those suffering from the war in Ukraine. The Christian Aid Week appeal raised £588 whilst in September we raised £1,389 for the victims of the devastating floods in Pakistan. The Christmas Appeal this year was directed towards the Genesis Project which provides relief for people in need, primarily in the disadvantaged areas of Middlesbrough- a total of £2,994 was raised.

Safeguarding Report



During my first year as Parish Safeguarding Officer I have worked with the PCC, clergy and the congregation to develop a culture of safeguarding at Christ Church to ensure that everyone is safe. This has involved DBS checks and safeguarding training for all who work with children or vulnerable adults within our parish. In November we raised the profile with Safeguarding Sunday.

It was an enjoyable service which was successful in highlighting what safeguarding is and why it needs to be embedded within the church. Moving forward DBS checks are now to be updated every three years and I will be working to meet the deadline of the end of the year for implementing this change.

I would like to thank everyone for their support and positive attitude to safeguarding. It is very much a team effort.

Stokesley Deanery Synod

I am sure that some of the people reading this will not really be aware of the Deanery and its activities. This is something that we are trying to overcome with improved communication but, if you do want to know more, please get in touch with any of the Deanery representatives.

Christ Church Lay Representatives during the year were, and still are, Rosemary Wheway, Nick Land, Ken Taylor and me. The clergy members of Synod are Paul Peverell, Jane Robson, Jon Dean and Geoff Jacques. So our parish has 8 out of 52 Synod members, in addition to which Ken Taylor was appointed Deanery Financial Advisor towards the end of the year. The Synod met four times in February, June, July and October and 2022 has been the year in which we have started things off after the hiatus of the pandemic.

The Deanery ended 2021 facing the challenge of bringing us all together, Living Christ's Story (LCS) and transforming our Church into one that is younger, better equipped and growing. The first half of 2022 was spent preparing our Deanery plan for LCS which was agreed and approved for submission to the Diocese at the July Synod. (Please get in touch if you would like a copy.)

The essence of the plan is that we must get out there and make new Disciples, as Jesus commanded. The only way we will survive as a Church is by offering the Good News to the wider community in such a way that the invitation is attractive and meets their needs, drawing them in.

LCS has three main tracks:

- Leading by prayer and worship – offering as many different options as possible to meet existing and potential needs of our communities;
- Welcoming and nurturing new and existing disciples – reaching out, listening and understanding what those needs are;
- Worshipping God by doing everything as well as we can – using our people, our buildings, skills, other resources, and our money, as effectively as possible.

The common thread throughout the plan is sharing ideas and experiences across the Deanery, finding out what works and multiplying it wherever possible, adapting and learning as we go.

The second half of the year began with us waiting for the Diocesan response to the submitted plan. It was somewhat underwhelming! A little inspiration and enthusiasm would go a long way but, to be fair, they were trying to consolidate the responses from all the Deaneries in the Diocese and prepare for the Diocesan Synod in November. We did meet Bishop Paul and Archdeacon Amanda and have the 'green light' to move forward. Our Deanery is one of the most stable in the Diocese and there are no plans for any reorganisation or major change. So our challenge at the end of 2022 is to mobilise our Church communities into action.

We will be working to build networks addressing different aspects of the LCS plan and using Deanery and Parish events to support those networks. Please get involved as it is the future of our Church that is at stake.

Christ Church Visitors



During the last year we have, sadly, lost several of the people we visit including one who has left the area to be nearer her family. We wish her well!

We currently have 16 Visitors who are in contact with 29 members of the congregation in Care Homes or their own homes and we are, thankfully, able to meet face to face again. Since November 2005, we have been in contact with 180 people who are mostly elderly or housebound. Sometimes we visit for a short time, for instance, following a stay in hospital until someone is able to return to church but often long term friendships are formed to the benefit of both sides.

We continue to meet regularly with the clergy so that they can monitor our visits and we review our guidelines annually.

Our aim is to visit anyone in the village in need – the housebound, lonely, sick and infirm – and this does not exclusively mean those who were regular churchgoers. We visit people mostly in their own homes but several of those visited eventually move out of the village to Care Homes and our Visitors travel to Stokesley, Middlesbrough, Nunthorpe, and Guisborough to stay in touch. We also visit hospitals when we are allowed.

On the first Monday of the month at 2pm the group supports the Coffee Lounge Communion service and also transports most of the people who would otherwise be unable to attend. These are open to **anyone** who appreciates a **weekday afternoon service** and is followed by refreshments. Please let us know if you would like a lift.

We continue to deliver cards on the first anniversary of a bereavement and also a Welcome Pack whenever we see a removal van in the village. Please tell us if you know someone who would like a visit or if you have new neighbours who would like a Welcome Pack.

All Saints Church

As for the whole of the country 2022 was a year of recovery for All Saints and my quiet optimism, expressed at the end of the 2021 Report was largely borne out. The church was open for the full summer season, from April to October, and a range of services and prayer events recommenced.



Highlight of the year was a classical guitar concert, beautifully performed by Jonathan Parkin (see photo). This took place on a balmy July evening during the summer heatwave, enjoyed by an audience of seventy, with wine served outside the church afterwards. In contrast the Candlelit Carol Service went ahead for the first time in three years on a freezing December night, but almost a hundred hardy souls packed the church for an uplifting sing.

Other notable events included the installation of a wooden bench, positioned outside the south chancel wall to allow tranquil repose and reflection looking out over the churchyard, thanks to the generosity of Grace Enderwick; another outdoor Eco Service in July; and an advertised Open Tour of the church on a Saturday morning, conducted by David Taylor.

The only slightly disappointing aspect of the year was the fact that visitor numbers were well down on pre-pandemic levels, though this should not have been a major surprise bearing in mind continuing post-covid caution, the cost of living pressures, and foreign holidays being back on the agenda. Also although we were fortunate to find some new recruits to replace several of our older experienced Guides who were forced to retire owing to declining health, coverage of weekend duties became an issue which needs addressing.

Nevertheless donations from visitors actually increased and together with income from the concert and some unexpected but very welcome charitable donations contributed to a healthy balance sheet, despite having to pay out over £1000 for the Quinquennial Inspection. This finally occurred in October and though we have yet to receive the full report, preliminary indications from the Inspector were that there were no major defects requiring urgent action.

In summary a very positive year and there is no reason to suppose that this will not continue in 2023. One thing I will be keeping an eye on is whether the change from Hambleton District Council to North Yorkshire County Council will have any effect on the maintenance of the churchyard. I am assured that in the short term it will not, but we must wait and see.

Middlesbrough Foodbank and Genesis Project

Food Bank Sunday continues to be on the third Sunday of each month, when food can be left at church to take to Middlesbrough Food Bank. All these donations were very gratefully received by the Food Bank, and I would like to thank everyone for their generosity.

Sadly, (and shockingly!) the need for the food bank is increasing as food and energy prices increase with inflation. The food bank provides three days of nutritionally balanced food for people in need, and for many, this is a real lifeline.

Financial donations can also be made, either directly to the foodbank (see their website for details), or via the church to pass on.

Over the past year we have been privileged to develop an increasing relationship with the Genesis Project based at St Oswalds and St Chads in Middlesbrough. The Genesis Project seeks to “share God’s love in practical ways to meet the urgent needs of the Community”. It does this through a food co-op, clothes bank, practical support, warm space, shared meals, pastoral support, worship, work opportunities and Children’s work.

Rev Kath Dean (who leads the project) and some of the volunteers often join us on Prayer for the Day. Christ Church helps the project by providing Trustees, volunteers and financial support. This years Christmas collection went to Genesis. Staff from Christ Church also support St Oswalds and St Chads by leading services.

ECO Church

This year has seen a significant level of collaboration across different groups – the Deanery Environment Network, the Diocesan Rural Life and Faith Group and the local Climate Action Stokesley and Villages.

It was great to see over 60 people turn out for our **April** evening organised jointly by the *Deanery Environment Network* and *Climate Action Stokesley and Villages* in Stokesley Town Hall. We heard an excellent overview from our main speaker Howard Petch CBE, former Principal of Bishop Burton College. He was ably supported by local farmers Robert Campbell MBE former Chairman of the national organisation LEAF (Linking Environment and Farming) and David Hugill. They were joined on the Panel by Margaret Price who chairs the *Diocese Rural Faith and Life Group*. It was encouraging to hear their answers to a wide range of questions and particularly encouraging that the different groups (consumers, farmers, churches and wildlifers) were all 'on the same page' seeking a balanced way forward.

In June we organised a stall with 'Climate Action Stokesley & Villages' at the village fete to promote 'Caring for Creation' which attracted a wide variety of interest from people of all ages.

In October we participated in the zoom conference 'Feeding Britain' organised by the *York Diocese 'Rural Life and Faith'* group featuring key note speaker Emeritus Professor Tim Lang.

Archdeacon Amanda preached at our second annual Bluebell Service on the first Sunday of **May**. We held our annual Eco Church service in the beautiful setting of All Saints Churchyard in **July**. We were delighted that friends from both St. Margaret's and the Methodist Church joined Christ Church in worship – the latter have subsequently started their own Eco Church programme. We even had some people join us who were just enjoying the churchyard. The intercessions were led powerfully by four of our young children and Little Fishes provided pictures of animals to show us what they wanted us grownups to look after. We prayed a prayer of commitment to doing our part to look after God's creation. Members of Christ Church Eco Group shared changes that they had made to give everyone some ideas of what they could do. Everyone went home with some more suggestions of Just One Thing that we can do; and a Cheeky Panda bamboo toilet roll as a reminder of what we had promised!

Also in **July**, 3 flowering cherry trees were planted in front of the Church Hall to mark the Queen's Diamond Jubilee. Earlier in the year we'd transplanted several groups of snowdrop bulbs.

I would like to thank the PCC for their continued financial support which allows us to do interesting crafts and run special events for the children.



Marwood Church of England Voluntary Controlled Infant School

Foundation Governors: Rev. Paul Peverell, David Fox and Vicky Bradley



Marwood continues to thrive, with much to celebrate over the year. The School very much lives out its Vision and responds to neighbours in need. As a result, it has been nick-named 'Mighty Marwood' by members of the York Diocese Education Team!



Developing a Global Conscience

Everyone at Marwood was thrilled to be awarded the Christian Aid Global Neighbours (CAGN) Bronze Award in March last year.



By adopting an outward perspective, the school has focussed on helping others in the local and global community. In February, Marwood School led community action which exceeded expectations in support of the Ukraine Appeal. A total of **six** van loads of humanitarian aid were collected and sent to distribution sites - a testament to the generosity of the local people and the school community.

Climate Justice



Marwood were approached by Christian Aid as one of six schools to be called to action for climate justice. Year 2 children worked with a professional artist to create a piece of artwork which was made into a postcard and used to send messages to the then chancellor - Rishi Sunak. The Year 2 children made their own climate pledges and learnt about the impact climate change was having on global neighbours. The result was a beautiful piece of artwork

with the postcards being used Nationally by Christian Aid.

Trinity Group



The Trinity Group, a children's focus group facilitated by one of the Foundation Governors, has also focussed on spirituality and developing an awareness of local and global challenges. The Ukraine Appeal, Climate Justice and Foodbanks were some of the topical issues explored in their meetings. The school is now enrolled for the CAGN Silver Award and focuses on the issues of Fairtrade and Climate Change. The school was delighted to have been chosen by the Co-op to be one of their charitable causes.

Outdoors in 'The Sacred Place', they plant, dig and prune and promote spiritual use of the area with handmade spiritual prompts giving the children the opportunity for peace and calmness in the playground.

The children have responsibility for regularly refreshing the spiritual areas in school such as the prayer chair in the collective worship space but also encouraging the children to lead in prayer and collective worship.

Annual Diocesan Conference

In June 2022, Marwood was overjoyed that due to the global work by the school, they were asked to deliver pupil-led collective worship at the Annual Diocesan Conference in York based on 'A Community of Hope'. The feedback about the



children was highly positive and reflective of the hard work and effort that went into the preparation for the event by the children, parents and staff. The highlight being a personal thank you from the Archbishop of York. There were numerous comments and correspondence after the event surrounding the behaviour and standard of their delivery, especially for children of such a young age.

Board of Governor Changes

Finally, after 27 years as Chairman of the Board of Governors, Rev. Peverell stepped back this October. Rev. Peverell has worked alongside many headteachers and staff in his time as Chair of the Governing Body and has been a vital source of support and guidance to all. Known affectionately as Rev. Pev. by the children, he remains on the governing body as Foundation Governor and continues to be a regular visitor in school, delivering Collective worship every Friday, always there for help advice. The governors and staff, past and present, joined Paul in celebrating his 27 years in September. We also welcomed Dr Jonathan Grimbley as Local Authority governor and Mrs Helen Berriman as parent governor to the board and have already exercising their governor responsibilities with enthusiasm.

Performance

Attendance and academic performance remain high. The staff have worked very hard to embed the new phonics programme into the curriculum and this is already having a positive impact and assisting with some of the interventions required after the pandemic. The curriculum continues to engage and excite the children, embedding our Christian values and encouraging a love of learning.

PTFA

The PTFA is very active and despite the cost of living crisis is able to fund several activities for the children during the year, the highlight being a trip to see a performance of The Snow Queen in December at The Arc in Stockton. The children also enjoyed a Christmas Bedtime story event hosted by Dorothy Walton (Headteacher) and run by parent volunteers.

All Saints

The churchyard and church at All Saints continue to be very well used by the school, for Science, History and Art with activities including nature walks, sowing bee bombs and learning to spot wild flowers. The PTFA also hosted a new parents gathering as their children took their first exciting steps at Marwood in the Summer Term.

Nativity Play

This year was the full return of the wonderful nativity play: 2022's extravaganza was 'The Hoity-Toity Angel' which took place over two dramatic and extremely vivacious performances which delighted the audience. As ever, the costumes, music and level of performance belied the Infant status of the school and left some tremendous memories.

Harvest Festival

A very well attended Harvest took place in Christ Church with music and readings led by the children: it was heart-warming to welcome back parents to these occasions and lusty renditions of many songs – with particular mention of 'Cauliflowers Fluffy' – were enjoyed by all.

Christingle

An excellent example of how well Marwood and Christ Church interact was seen this year in the Christingle Service: after many years of wonderful service to the event, the team of leaders passed the mantle on to Ali Prunty whose team, guided by Karen and Vicki, decided to involve the school and indeed the village children in the event more fully. Hence invitations were sent out, and a Christingle-making afternoon took place in the coffee lounge with 34 children attending, the majority

from Marwood. The 100 Christingles were assembled in about 50 minutes and all the families returned to Church for the Sunday evening service. 188 people attended and we hope that the link between the schools and the church continues in a new and very exciting tradition.

Online – Facebook & Zoom



Amazingly we had our 1000th daily service live on Facebook in December!

Since the end of March 2020, each weekday at 8:45am we have broadcast a 15 minute Prayer for the Day led by Paul and Jane, with music by Olwen and talks, psalms and prayers led by a wide range of people on zoom from within Ayton and beyond – including participants in Stokesley, Ingleby Barwick, Grove Hill, Whitby and all the way from New Zealand!

Not surprisingly daily numbers were much higher in 2020 than in the past year, but if you compare numbers who joined for more than a minute across the three months of December: 2020 averaged 39, in 2021 down to 21 and 2022 an incredible 18! In just the 6 days after Christmas, 21 different people made themselves known on our Prayer for the Day Facebook videos either by a comment or a 'like', mainly from the village but stretching all the way down to the south coast.

Our Sunday Services in December attracted around 30 people with 40 for Midnight Mass and 69 for the Carol Service. Numbers from Social Media sources can be deceptively high, hence rather than quoting the hundreds and thousands that are “reached” we restrict our count to those who were with us for at least a minute.

Facebook is a great place to alert people to recent deaths and upcoming funerals as well as Food Bank alerts and other events. Such posts regularly reach 3000 with 1000+ engagements. An excellent community service.



The guides have also taken part in harvest and remembrance parades and did shoeboxes for love in a box. Just before Christmas Charlotte and Lois, gained their silver awards.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 31 December 2022

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparation

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland issued in October 2019, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011 and UK Generally Accepted Practice.

The financial statements have been prepared to give a "true and fair" view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a "true and fair view". This departure has involved following the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued in October 2019 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1st April 2005 which has since been withdrawn.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis, under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest £.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

Restricted funds represent donations or grants received for a specific object or invited by the PCC for a specific object. The funds may only be expended on the specific object for which they were given. Any balance remaining unspent at the end of each year is carried forward as a balance on that fund. The PCC does not normally invest separately for each fund.

Unrestricted funds are general funds which can be used for PCC ordinary purposes

Income: Planned giving, collections and donations are recognised when received. Tax refunds are recognised when the incoming resource to which they relate is received. Grants and Legacies are accounted for when the PCC is legally entitled to the amounts due. Interest is accounted for when received. All other income is recognised when it is receivable. Incoming resources are generally accounted for gross except fees which are net of amounts paid directly to the Diocese and other third parties

Expenditure: Grants and donations are accounted for when paid over, or when awarded, if that award creates a binding or constructive obligation on the PCC. The Diocesan freewill offering is accounted for when due. Amounts received specifically for mission are dealt with as restricted funds. All other expenditure is generally recognised when it is incurred and is accounted for gross.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Fixed assets

Consecrated and benefice property is not included in accordance with S10(2)(a) and (c) of the Charities Act 2011

Moveable church furnishings held by the Vicar and Churchwardens on special trust for the PCC and which require a faculty for disposal are inalienable property, listed in the Church's inventory, which can be inspected at any reasonable time. For anything acquired prior to 2000 there is insufficient cost information available and therefore such assets are not valued in the financial statements.

Equipment used within the church premises is depreciated on a straight line basis over 4 years. Individual items of equipment with a purchase price of £500 or less are written off when the asset is acquired.

Investments are valued at market value at 31 December
