## What Is Truth?

“What is truth?”, is the question asked by Pontius Pilate in the trial of Jesus as all sorts of charges and claims are laid against Jesus and Pilate struggles to administer justice.



Do you find yourself asking that same question today with many of the issues facing the world?

 We love simplicity and a simple White/ Black, Yes/ No, Right/Wrong situation that can easily sort Goodies from Baddies. The trouble is that the world is usually more complicated than that, and rather than an obvious choice,  we may be presented with a spectrum with white and black at either end, but a lot of grey in between. When does the grey become white or black, and is it affected by who has the best PR?

When earthquakes hit, initial casualties are usually low until the full scale is revealed as the days go on. When it was thought an Israeli missile had hit a hospital in Gaza, Hamas immediately claimed that there were 500 casualties to this barbaric act. Then it turned out it was a rocket from their own side that hit the car park and the numbers were reduced to 50, and then quietly forgotten. What is truth? There is so much manipulation by both sides, it's often hard to see anything other than grey.

Social Media has complicated things too, as so much opinion is packaged as the truth, and It's so convincing. In November of last year an Artificial Intelligence generated audio of Mayor of London, Sadiq Khan, disparaging Remembrance weekend and calling for pro-Palestine marches to take precedence went viral. It was believed by many, I suspect on both sides of the opinion, but it was a fake. Mark Twain said a lie can travel halfway around the world whilst truth is still putting on its shoes. But when you check that quote on Google, it appears Jonathan Swift said it first!

In his Letter, Saint James says My dear brothers and sisters, take note of this: Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry. (James 1:19). In today's society where opinion is manipulated by PR, Artificial Intelligence and Algorithms, we would be wise to follow James advice. Be cautious about what you believe, and never Forward or pass on unless you know it to be right. Maybe Pilate had it right, and the most important question for us to ask today is “What is Truth?”




# VILLAGE LENT COURSE

There was a lovely warmth of atmosphere in Church and you could see Bishop Paul was enjoying the occasion too.

We said our thank yous to him at the end of the service with a card and gift.





We managed to get some group photos of both the choir and Parish staff, although some were missing from both due to other commitments. The singing from both choir and congregation was excellent. Thank you to all.



# CHURCHWARDENS' REPORT

Over the last year we have continued to meet for worship at our regular Sunday Services in church at 8am and 9.15am, with Sunday school meeting regularly at the 9.15 service. The 9.15am service continues to be transmitted by zoom and Facebook. Cafe church meets in the church hall every 2nd and 4th Sunday at 4pm, led by Nick Land, and Steve Green, and we are seeing increasing numbers of adults and children attending. A new discussion group has started for 8yr olds and over and this has an enthusiastic following. Weekday services - Holy Communion on Wednesday at 10am, and coffee lounge Communion on the first Monday at 2pm, are also well attended. Prayer for the Day (8.45am via zoom and Facebook) continues to be a blessing to people, both from our own church and other churches near and far.



The damp that was affecting the south west corner of the church has been dealt with. Following re pointing of external stonework in that aea, the internal wall has been replasterd and painted. The main doors to the church have had draught proofing strips added and been re-hung, which has successfully reduced the draughts.

In September the Quinquennial Inspection was carried out, and reported that “The Church is in really good condition and is clearly well looked after by the PCC”. We would like to thank all who have been involved in maintaining the Church building, both past and present, for a job well done. There are some isolated areas of re-pointing that need doing, as well as some redecorating, and we will be tackling these over the next months. The Spire also needs closer inspection and possible re-pointing.

We have checked that the church silver and other items of value are kept safely. Since Paul moved to Nunthorpe in the summer, we are very grateful to our team of “Doorkeepers” who regularly unlock and lock the church each day.

There is a large group of people working behind the scenes week by week to enable our church to function, and we are very grateful to everybody who helps. This group includes our sidespeople, servers, volunteer cleaners, flower arrangers, and the coffee team. New people have joined these teams, serving God and our

church community. We all have a role to play in the functioning of our church - please consider prayerfully what you could contribute.

We thank God for His continued blessings, enabling us to fulfil His ministry here in Great Ayton.

## **Helen Land & Jonathan Winterschladen**

As reported in last month's Spire, Jonathan has decided not to stand again this year as Churchwarden due to other commitments.

This means that we are looking for someone else with time and interest, and hopefully a knowledge of the workings of the Church, to be able to take this on, but what does a Churchwarden do? Here is a brief Guide, but don't panic as the PCC and other Church Officers are there to assist.

Churchwardens are responsible for ensuring that the PCC cares for and maintains the church and its contents and other buildings in the parish, and the churchyard or grounds.

They are responsible for ensuring that:-

- there is a terrier, (the list and description of any land or buildings belonging to the church).
- proper records of any property transactions, including licences under Faculty and tenancy agreements and leases are kept..
- an annually updated inventory and photographic record of all the items belonging to the church it retained.
- quinquennial repairs are carried out
- a log book of all alterations and repairs to the church and its lands and contents exists.
- appropriate building and contents insurances are in place.
- an annual report is made on the fabric of the church and any other buildings to the Annual Parochial Church Meeting.
- all valuable items are securely kept.
- the Archdeacon and the DAC are consulted about any repairs or alteration to the church, or any acquisitions or disposals of contents, and that a Faculty is obtained before any work is begun.

## **Liturgy and Worship**

In the absence of the parish priest they are responsible, with the Area Dean, for ensuring that there is someone to conduct services, and that liturgy and the life of the parish continues as far as possible as with the previous incumbent. They must check that all visiting clergy hold the Bishop's licence or Permission to Officiate. (At Christ Church we are very fortunate in having assistant staff, both clergy & Readers.)

- They should ensure that the service register and other registers are properly filled in.
- During a vacancy in the parish, they, with the Area Dean, are responsible for the good ordering of the parish.
- They are responsible for ensuring that people are properly welcomed to the church and to services, and that sidespeople are appointed.
- They are responsible for good order in the church and churchyard or the equivalent. In the event of a service being disrupted or a disturbance in church they should call the police, and, if necessary, may arrest a person, or escort them off the premises.
- At the end of their period of office churchwardens should handover their keys to their successors, and the inventory, which should then be checked and signed.

Churchwardens are not expected to do everything above themselves, but to make sure that there are other people available to carry out the various tasks.

As we approach the first vacancy in the Parish since 1992, we need to get the right person as Churchwarden

. The Church of England is not a congregational Church that just looks to itself, but has responsibilities to the wider community too.

So ideally a person of faith, a good organiser, someone who has a heart for the community as well as the Church, can help represent all the people who belong.

It's not an impossible job, as we have had a succession of very good Churchwardens in the Benefice who fulfil the role admirably. Could it be you?

## Christ Church Visitors

In 2023 we had 16 Visitors who were in contact with 26 members of the congregation in Care Homes or their own homes. Since November 2005, we have been in contact with 189 people who are mostly elderly or housebound. Sometimes we visit for a short time, for instance, following a stay in hospital until someone is able to return to church and very often long term friendships are formed to the benefit of both sides. We continue to meet regularly with the clergy so that they can monitor our visits and we review our guidelines annually.



Our aim is to visit anyone in the village in need – the housebound, lonely, sick and infirm – and this does not exclusively mean those who were regular churchgoers. We visit people mostly in their own homes but several of those visited eventually move out of the village to Care Homes and our Visitors travel to Stokesley, Middlesbrough, Nunthorpe, and Guisborough to stay in touch. We also visit hospitals when this is appropriate.

During the latter half of 2023 we made a concerted effort to increase the number of those attending the Coffee Lounge Communion. This takes place on the first Monday of the month at 2pm and we transport most of the people who would otherwise be unable to attend. These services are open to **anyone** who appreciates a **weekday afternoon service** and is followed by refreshments. Please let us know if you would like to attend.

On December 4<sup>th</sup> 2023 15 people and 8 helpers attended the Carol Service which was a 90% increase on the previous year.

We continue to deliver cards on the first anniversary of a bereavement and also a Welcome Pack whenever we see a removal van in the village. Please tell us if you know someone who would like a visit or if you have new neighbours who would like a Welcome Pack.

## Looking Back... With Malcolm Race

Do you remember the nesting tawny owl in the Church Car Park? This wasn't the first bird to cause a problem to Ayton churchgoers.

### Birds of Pray

In his book, Cleveland Village, the Rev. Robert Kettlewell recalls a story concerning the Rev. Joseph Ibbetson, who came to Ayton from Nunthorpe in 1827 at the age of 26 and remained until 1887.



Mr David Bottomley, who was the constable for several years up to 1856, possessed a tame jackdaw generally known as "Jack." "Jack was a great favourite, though at times a considerable nuisance," says Mr Kettlewell. "It seems that the two bells in the old church tower had some peculiar fascination for him, for no sooner did they begin to ring than Jack, unfailingly, flew to the churchyard and, perching himself on the headstones there, began to cry 'Jack, Jack' to the people as they went up the path to church.

"When everyone had gone inside and the service had begun, Jack then flew to one of the windows and, looking in, started to tap on the glass panes loudly and continuously. The attention of the congregation was apt to be drawn away by this punctuation of Mr Ibbetson's sermons and some were amused.

"The vicar, therefore, wanted the nuisance to be stopped; but one day, meeting a certain William Williamson, an old blacksmith and a staunch friend of Jack, the following conversation ensued: 'Here, ah wants a wod wi thoo Mither Ibbetson'. 'Well, what is it?' said Mr Ibbetson.

"They tells me that thoo wants poor Jack putten off ?' Mr Ibbetson replied that he thought any reasonable person would. Noo then,' said Mr Williamson, "Ah'll tell thoo summat! If a voat wer taken ti-morrow of t'wole village which should gan - thoo or Jack - IT WADN'T BE JACK!"

"And so the question was settled and Jack was left victoriously undisturbed !"
