Back to the Future

We are told that Lockdowns are now behind us and from 21 June all restrictions will be lifted. I hope they are right, but it would be a very brave person to believe that, given what we are seeing happen in other parts of the world with 3rd waves and new variants. Nevertheless, we move forward in hope



with worship becoming more regular and more folk gaining the confidence to come back out again. It's not just Sunday worship for we also have 20 weddings and at least 15 Baptisms coming up.

We hope we will soon see the return of the choir to Church and eventually even congregational singing. Alas the organ hasn't enjoyed Lockdown and gives the impression of Thomas the Tank Engine meeting all his pals with lots of ciphers - so work needed there.

I asked the PCC about what time they wanted for Sunday mornings - a return to 9.15am or stay with 9.30am, and wasn't too surprised they unanimously chose the latter. This does have implications, for packing away IT at Christ Church and setting back up again for Zoom at Newton simply can't be achieved by I Iam. I know some think the simple answer is to put Newton's service back, but I am now coming across to Christ Church at 7am to get things ready, and after Newton's service I have Christenings and weddings, so a further delay means another 45 minutes at least on my day. From May onwards I will have to leave Christ Church open unattended as wont be back by Ipm, but I really hope we can get back to having Church open all the time again for folk to pop in. If people sanitise hands on entry I am sure that Church will still be a very safe place to be.

So for the summer months the plan is that on the 1st & 3rd Sundays of the month when I have Newton services we will have the shorter Morning Worship at Christ Church and a 5pm Service of Holy Communion according to the Book of Common Prayer. On the 2rd & 4th Sundays we will have 8am and 9.30am Services of Holy Communion. Details will be in Spire and on the Website. We are alternating between 8am and 5pm because some people cannot make the 8am now. We will look again before September.

Other good news is that we are restarting the Wednesday Communion Service at 10am on the first Wednesday of the month beginning 5th May. We will review this too as time goes on.

New Members We welcomed two new members onto the Church Council, Mary Mason and Gill Hendry.

Stepping Down Several people have made decisions to step down from roles they have been doing, or are not confident yet on restarting them. Ruth Waterton has handed over the task of arranging Intercessors for Sundays; Pauline Titchmarsh has stepped down from organising the after Church Coffee; Lesley Miller has retired as Head Server and Vicki Nath has retired from the PCC. We thank them all for many years of faithful and willing service. Whilst some tasks haven't started up again yet, when they do we will need new people taking over some of the roles.

Church Cleaning In the first lockdown we were instructed not to ask anyone over 70 to do anything in Church, which was locked in any case. This greatly affected our Church cleaning team. Church has been kept clean, initially by Jan Thompson who cleaned before we re-opened and on Sunday the Vicar runs around with the hoover on Sundays.

The PCC agreed to employ a cleaner, but rather than employ a new person we used the Church Hall cleaners who had spare hours. Church has been closed for several weeks since then making any appointment difficult, but now both Church and Hall are open again we need to look again. The bottom line is that the fall in Income over last year has made it harder to find funds to pay a cleaner. Are there any volunteers who would still be wiling to help clean the Church?

Living Christ Story The PCC will be looking at this initiative at the next meeting in May. A small group was also formed to begin looking at **Living Together in Faith & Love**, a recent report that looks at the whole issue of relationships,

identity and sexuality.

Coffee Lounge We had complaints from hearing aid users that there was too much of an echo in the Coffee Lounge following renovation with the removal of curtains and carpet. Noise baffles have now been installed.



Other News



New Area Dean Following the move to Grantham at Easter of Rev'd Clay Roundtree who had become Area Dean of Stokesley Deanery last September, the Rev'd Tessa Stephens of St Mary's Church Nunthorpe has been appointed to the role. It's good to have someone younger in the role to guide our response to Living Christ's Story - the Diocesan response to the challenging times we are in. Our prayers and support are with Tessa.

Recycled Cards

Most charities are facing finacial pressures following last year, so you can help by leaving Greeting Cards (Not Christmas cards, please) at the back of Christ Church for Pauline Titchmarsh to recycle. Church is open on Sundays for services and between Ipm - 3pm, but they can also be left safely in a bag in the porch if the Church is locked.

Water Comes To Saint Oswald's



The beautiful Norman Church of Saint Oswald's, whilst bursting with charm, has lacked the essentials of water on site. Anything needed for cleaning or refreshments has had to be physically brought to the Church.

The PCC decided that now was the time to put that to rights and so in April - the day after the snow - Simon Greenwell arrived to install the water.



A large trench had to be dug up the path big enough to work in, and an archaeologist was on site in case any bones or ancient artefacts were discovered. One small bone was re-interred in the hole, but sadly no Saxon gold.

Les Sutton Haigh on the digger thought being in the sunshine and looking at Roseberry Topping must make this one of the best jobs around.



The cellar wall was I metre thick - quite a challenge to get through, but all was accomplished. As well as the water pipe, an electric cable was also laid above it down to the lychgate so we can have lights on the path to it that can be switched on from Church. Soon all was back to normal with new gravel laid.

We await connection by the water board. The next part of the project is to install a small kitchen in the vestry for after service refreshments and an appeal will be launched shortly. Thanks to Chris & John Stinson for all their hard work and efforts coordinating this.

The scheme covers 7 areas of household life:

- · Possessions
- · Community and global engagement

How the scheme works

- 1. Register using the form on the Households page.
- 2. Once you're registered and logged in you can make a start. As we are a registered church, you can link your account to the church account by logging on, then search for Christ Church, Great Ayton in the 'Church Affiliation' box, select it then press the green 'Save' button underneath.
- 3. Start to fill in the questionnaire; pick an area and start working your way through that. You can save your progress at any time using the "Save" button.

- 4. Keep track of your progres using the Overview page which will update to show how you're doing in each area.
- 5. Once you've completed your questionnaire, press 'Get certificate' to download your certificate.

Peter Receives Maundy Money from The Queen



Peter Titchmarsh received a lovely surprise before Easter when he heard that he had been nominated by the Diocese to be one of this year's recipients of Maundy Money from Her Majesty the Queen.

The tradition arose as a means of the Sovereign recognising service and they usually hand out the money each year at a different Cathedral. This year it was scheduled to be at Westminster Abbey, but with restrictions the service was cancelled and the coins were sent out together with a letter from the Queen. She says "I am delighted to send you this Maundy gift which I hope you will accept as a personal thanks for all that you have done to enrich the life of your community." Peter has completed over 50 years as a Reader, and one assumes this would be why the Diocese put his name forward.



Special coins are minted and the Queen presents to the same number of men and women as her age (95 of each) and coins to the same value. The small silver coins in the packet are 4p, 3p, 2p & Ip coins. The 50p represents 50 years since decimalization, and the large £5 coin represents the Queen's 95th Birthday. The coins were initially given as a clothing allowance but will now be kept as treasured keepsakes.

We are pleased that one of our community has been recognised in this way.
