Three Years?!

Can it really be nearly three years since I joined you in Great Ayton and Newton under Roseberry? In one respect it has flown by. But I also feel that I've been with you for decades!

My curacy didn't start well. I was recovering from a blundered operation and wasn't quite up to throwing myself into life as a curate. But fortunately, the world shut down in order to give me time to recover. Well you might have thought that it was in order to prevent spread of Covid, but I'm sure it was just for me. Instead of lots of house visits, my first few months were spent with ringing people up and introducing myself, not knowing if they even knew that they had a new curate!

Most introductions were made on Zoom, something which I didn't even know existed until spring 2020, and now I use on an almost daily basis for services. Some days



twice a day! Our loyal Prayer for the Day gang who join us each morning have been such a blessing. I will really miss you. I really didn't understand at the beginning what an essential part of ministry Zoom would become! But it did make learning names easier – except for those who just called themselves iPad! I think I need to insist that everyone in my new parish wear name badges for the first 6 months until I get to know them!



My deaconing service was delayed and I could only invite 6 guests. Mum couldn't be there because she had already started deteriorating. I really appreciate the support, love and understanding which all of you showed me during this difficult time and after she died. It was a real privilege to take her funeral, even if Covid restricted numbers. But it did spawn the #weathercrossstitch project, and I know many of you enjoyed following its progress.

Priesting was a different thing all together with as many as 60 in the building! And what weather! For the rest of my life thunder and lightening will be called ordination weather!



As I said on the day, I wasn't sure



whether God was protesting, or whether I should be worried at just what sort of a ministry he was inaugurating!

Throughout my time with you I have been able to get stuck into many things. completed the theology degree which was curtailed by my hospital stay. It is good not to have any more essays to write. As well as Sunday services, the usual weddings wedding). (especially the two-tractor baptisms and funerals (including my first burial at which a pall bearer nearly fell into the grave) it has been a pleasure to get involved

with Great Ayton Churches Together, making many friends through the Lent Groups and other activities like last year's Eco service and the prayer walk during Thy Kingdom Come.

The monthly services at Fry Court have also been fun. And thank you to the Thursday evening Lent groups. I have valued your friendship and openness and I will miss you.



It has been a real pleasure working with Geoff on Come and Praise and with Rosie at Little Fishes. And it has been good to work Mary on Safeguarding, with especially the running Safeguarding Service last November, which received several comments of how joyful it was - a phrase I never thought would go with Safeguarding! And



I've really enjoyed developing the Café Church worshipping community with Nick, and with Steve when he returned to the country. We have grown together and it is great that some of the children insist on dragging their parents to the service! May you continue to grow in discipleship and fellowship.

Thank you all for making me so welcome. I have truly enjoyed my time here. There are so many other people who have made it such a special time but I can't mention all of you. God knew that I needed to come to you for my training – and fortunately Bishop Paul listened. And I must give very special thanks to our Rev Pev for agreeing to take a curate when he was ready to start taking things a little easier. I hope that I haven't been too much trouble. You have been amazing and I will never forget all that you have done for me and shared with me. But I have kept your phone number and new address – you haven't heard the last of me!

I will take so much with me to my new parish, of Kirkleatham. But especially I will take fond memories of you all. I'm sure that at some time in the future 'I'll be back' to your beautiful villages. But do please keep in touch or come to visit if you fancy a trip to the seaside.

Living Christ's Story; UPDATE

Deanery Plans

All the 21 deaneries that make up the Diocese of York were represented by their Lay and Area Deans when they met with the York Diocesan Leadership Team (YDLT) at Bishopthorpe Palace, home of the Archbishop of York, on the 11th May, to share evening prayer and an update on the Living Christ's Story process. This was an opportunity for people from across the Diocese to ask questions and contribute to the design of the ongoing activities associated with our Living Christ's Story vision and our Revitalised Growth Strategy for the whole diocese.

'Living Christ's Story – York Diocese's Strategic Plan 2021-2031', accepted by York Diocesan Synod in November 2022 as the strategic growth plan for the diocese, has already drawn on the deanery plans devised and submitted in the summer of 2022, setting out the case for change and some key milestones and objectives that need to be achieved by 2026, which will be an important staging post in the direction of travel to 2031.

Diocesan Director for Strategic Transformation, Sam Nicol, explained that in the last few months the deanery plans have been thoroughly interrogated to support the discussions and actions taken during the implementation planning phase. This has included the data and information that will be collected and scrutinised on a regular basis not only to confirm a current context, but to set a benchmark against which forward progress will be monitored and shared.

Coordination of activities

YDLT has been developing a structure over the last few months, to enable implementation and oversight of Living Christ's Story through decision-making, alignment, accountability, collaboration and sequencing. A steering group and implementation coordination group have now been established.

The first implementation coordination group (ICG) will be held on 26th June 2023. The ICG is expected to ensure coordination among the various parts of the Diocese, between the Diocesan offices and parishes and deaneries. It will foster a shared commitment to agreed common gims which will develop as we work together to clarify issues, formulate strategies, and develop action plans. The Group will be responsible for ensuring an effective change management approach on which the implementation plan to deliver Living Christ's Story is set. It will allow direct and auick input from key stakeholders when designing, ICG Group will be the mechanism through which the deaneries and parishes will be advised, involved, engaged and encouraged to undertake tasks relating to the achievement of Living Christ's Story.

Looking Back with Malcolm Race

Recycling is the buzz word these days, but it can be carried a bit far - and it is obviously not a new idea.

A cutting from the Evening Gazette of March 30,192[^] relates a curious story of a "parish coffin" which at that time still existed at Easingwold. 'Years ago," the writer explained, "when the meagre wages of



agricultural labourers did not permit the luxury of a separate coffin, the parochial authorities provided one for indigent parishioners.

"When a death occurred in the village, the coffin was taken from the church, in which it is still stored, to the home of the deceased and the body placed therein until the funeral service was concluded. Then the body was tipped, sans ceremony, into the grave and the coffin replaced in the church to await the next death."

'The grisly relic is pointed out to visitors as one of the more interesting relics in Easingwold's quaint church." The cutting also records that a horse-drawn hearse was maintained by the parochial authorities in Bilsdale. "No regular driver is employed and it is by no means unusual for a person at the last extremity to nominate some old crony to guide his last earthly journey."

Canon J.C. Atkinson, in his famous book "40 Years in a Moorland Parish," quoted a man being buried with a candle, a penny and a bottle of port - "the candle to light the way to Jerusalem, the penny to pay the ferry and the port to sustain him on the journey."

He also recalls some other quaint burial customs. "In the dales the coffin was never borne on the shoulders of the bearers as is the custom elsewhere. So far as it is 'carried by hand,' it is carried by the aid of towels knotted together and passed under the coffin, the ends on either side held by the bearers, six in number (or three pairs).

"A single young woman was borne by six young women, a single young man by six of his peers, a married woman by six married women and so on. It was not unusual to see a child carried by six children.

"In the case of young unmarried women, some peculiarisation of costumes were always to be observed about the bearers. Their dress was not all unrelieved black; white sashes or scarves were customarily worn and white gloves always."

Canon Atkinson added that hymns and psalms were sung as the funeral cortege left the deceased's home and at intervals on the way, including a hymn at the church entrance.

ROSEBERRY SCHOOL DARJEELING

SUPPORTED BY SCHOOL AID INDIA

Earlier this year, I was impatient to hear from Darjeeling. With the effects of Covid behind them, what was new, what were their aims for this school year?

Well, they now have over 180 pupils, with parents already making enquiries about places in 2024. Extra furniture had to be made to accommodate bigger classes sizes, and increased numbers of children highlighted the need for more toilet facilities. These matters may seem boring but we are all keen to maintain a good working environment for both pupils and teachers.

Roseberry is in its 17th year, and the pause for Covid lockdowns delayed the updating and extending of their stock of books for daily reading and for reference. So this year we have begun the systematic purchase of large numbers of new volumes focusing initially on the teaching of phonics.

For me, the most precious news relates to ex pupils and their achievements. This is the time of year when they get their Secondary School exam results, and I am delighted to tell you that all our ex pupils have passed this year. They also tell us about their hopes and dreams for the future. These stories tell of Roseberry's true achievements and I'll mention just three

I met Barun (on the front row wearing a cap) in 2002 when he was a delightful little three year old of whom I have fond memories. Now Barun is studying at St Josephs College, a very good school in Darjeeling and preparing for his end of school Exams, but Barun has a very special talent. He has passed Grade VIII in violin and plays for a local string group. His ambition is to join the national symphony orchestra as a violinist, learning new music and travelling the world.

Samir, just behind Barun wearing a grey top and red scarf, is studying economics but wants to be an actor.

Heena, (just visible on the back row behind Samir and wearing a yellow top), was clearly a bright, hard working girl when she was at Roseberry. I was very angry when the local government- supported secondary school St Teresa's refused her admission because she was a muslim. However, she did very well at a different school and came top of her classes. During lockdown she wrote to me about the difficulties of trying to follow 6th form science lessons on a mobile. She suffered badly from headaches. Now she has finished school and wants to become a doctor. She has applied for medical college but has covered herself by applying for a less specialist science course.

Since Roseberry School first opened I too have dreamed dreams, and the success these young people are making of their lives is both a joy and an inspiration.
