I confess that I didn't watch the Women's World Cup, for having been so bad at team sports at school, they have never turned me on. Nevertheless I always wish our National teams well. There was no escaping hearing about them, though. One commentator said "England's



Lionesses looked blond, blue eyed and lacked diversity." There's always seems to be some criticism these days that we are a racist country. It was just last year at the Coronation we had the criticism that the balcony scene was "too white!" In the press the week I write, an advert for London featuring a white family of mum, dad, boy and girl has been criticised as "not being representative of London."

Well, a quick Google search reveals that the same criticisms could be applied to many other football teams, (I can't feature photos due to copyright), and I wonder how many white people are in the Saudi Royal Family? Yes, London has become more diverse in recent years, but Dickens London was predominately white, and in my childhood London featured cockneys, Pearly Kings and Queens appeared on Blue Peter, and we celebrated its Christian Heritage as we sang Oranges and Lemons, says the bells of Saint Clements. We can't help having a past that was predominately white, that's the way it was for us, and many other countries experience the same.

Just check out the wide variety of supermarkets and restaurants that cater for many cultures in our towns and cities.

Yes, we have a past, and like all countries it's a mix of good and bad, but on balance this country has done lots of good throughout the world and when we have become aware of the bad we have tried to do something about it. Slavery is an example. It started in the ancient world in the Middle East when we were still running around in wode and has happened with most cultures who have become dominant, Yes, we did have an involvement in slavery for a time, but as the evils of this trade became apparent we not only gave a lead by stopping our involvement in the slave trade, but used our Royal Navy

over several years to put an end to the worldwide trade for everyone else. This came at a great cost to our nation. 

A Big Surprise

It was a big surprise to receive a letter from the Archbishop of York on Holy Saturday (the day before Easter) inviting me to join the College of Canons of York Diocese. Some very kind words were said about my ministry here in these Parishes, and this is a way of acknowledging contributions to the life of



the Diocese by bringing Parishes into the centre, and then they can bring the message back to the Parishes. The College of Canons are also responsible for the Minster, but in reality the Dean and the Residentiary Canons do this work, and the wider body act like the people attending the APCM in Parishes. It's a way of accountability.

Clergy are installed into certain stalls in the Minster, that represent ancient Parishes that used to provide a living for them. At one time they were expected to help with the day to day worship in the Minster, but if they couldn't get there to do that, as they still had to work in their own Parishes, then they appointed Vicar Chorals to do the job for them of singing the offices each day. I am to be made Canon and Prebend of Husthwaite, an ancient village just off the A19.

I thought and prayed hard about this over Easter weekend, as my full time ministry is approaching the last lap and I have had the title "Canon" since 2005 when I was made a Canon of Ho Diocese in Ghana. I used that for a while, as that was a gift to express appreciation for helping in the formation of the Diocese, but reverted to "Rev Pev" which remains my favourite handle. I decided to graciously accept, for to my knowledge Great Ayton and Newton under Roseberry haven't had a vicar be Canon of York before, so it is good recognition for the Parishes here and

also flies the flag for Stokesley Deanery following the retirement of Rev'd Canon John Ford from Yarm Parish in 2020.

I am to be installed as Canon, together with nine others, on **Saturday 16 September at the 5.30pm** Service of Evensong, which is open to the Public. This will be followed by a drinks reception. If you would like to come, it would be lovely to see some familiar faces. Just let me know, and I will advise the Minster of numbers.

These linked events are to mark the beginning of the Season of Creation which the Church of England celebrates each year from September 1st to the Feast Day of St Francis on October 4th.




How to Hear God

Looking Back with Malcolm Race

Did you know that during the first World War the village played host to numbers of Belgian refugees?

The parish magazine for May 1919 carries a report of "Great Ayton Belgians' Hospitality Committee,"

whose chairman was Sir John Fry, treasurer Mr J.F. Whitwell and secretary Mr F. Rivers Arundel.



"The committee were able to arrange for all the Belgians under their care to leave Ayton for repatriation on March 21," the report says. "During the $4 \cdot 1/4$ years they have been with us over £300 has been raised and expended (of which £230 was contributed by the committee).

"The number of refugees has varied from 8 to 16, including some at Northallerton. On an average we have assisted them at the rate of about 2/6 per head per week. The committee wish to offer their sincere thanks to all who have subscribed or given help by gifts and loans of material.

"Owing to the short notice of their departure there remains £20 to collect for the necessary expenses of repatriation, towards which the committee would be glad to receive contributions."

The report then quotes a letter which had been received from "the Family Casteleyn," in Antwerp:

"We do not feel satisfied with our vote of thanks in the paper and personally and therefore we beg to send our hearty thanks to you once more and will always feel thankful to you all for your kindness to us in the past, which we appreciate very highly.... Things are improving a little now but are far dearer to what they are in England, yet we have to put up with such things so to make our way once again in this part.".

A Great Improvement



In All Saints Churchyard stand a rather grand memorial to William Augustus Loy FRCS. He was obviously very well to do and much respected in the Parish, and his memorials are in both All Saints and Christ Church. He died on 10 November 1886, just as Christ Church was opened and must be amongst the last to be buried in All Saints Churchyard. His wife Hannah Loy died the following year.

There is a window in Christ Church near the link door that celebrates one of Jesus' healing miracles on the left, and the passage from Proverbs detailing

the qualities of a good wife on the right, remembering Augustus and Hannah Loy. Whilst the window is often decorated with flowers, the grave has usually been overgrown with weeds.

Well, not any more. Thanks to the hard work and dedication of Martin Helm, the grave has been restored more to its former glory. We thank Martin for this, and all who help keep All Saints Churchyard in such a good state, whilst also being eco friendly.


