Choosing a new Archbishop

And so the process has started to find a successor to Archbishop Sentamu who is due to retire next June. I don't envy those charged with the job, or the likely contenders. They always advise on not following a popular priest in a Parish and I am sure that likewise Archbishop Sentamu will

be a very hard act to follow. He has spoken out clearly on many issues and has managed to capture well the public mood on many occasions. He has faithfully

stood by those going through tough times, like the family of Claudia Lawrence who disappeared one morning in York never to be seen again, and the Chapel at Bishopthorpe Palace has become a focus for many prayers over the years. He has got out and about like no other Archbishop of York that I can remember, and we welcomed him here on Christmas Eve in 2015. Two years later I accompanied him to visit the 6th Form at Nunthorpe Secondary Academy and he held the young peoples attention with a story only he could give. He has Even Archbishops like Petch's Pies! inspired people by sermons and through initiatives



like the Young Leaders Awards and ACTS 345. It will be a brave person who follows on, and they will have to be themselves.

There have been various meetings where views have been sought as to what the Diocese hope for in the 30% of the Archbishop's time that is granted to us. If you tot up the man hours this has cost already, it is already an expensive process.

I did suggest a shorter route at Chapter, as it's likely that the successful candidate will already be a Diocesan Bishop, so just lock all the likely contenders in a Church, televise their conversations and we could vote one off each night until left with the winner. Sadly they are going for a more formal route. Of the 15 strong interview panel we have a

voice in our own Nick Land, who is also Lay Chair of Diocesan Synod and a General Synod Member. Please pray for them in their task.

We wish them all well in their work as we pray that God may guide the right person through the system. Meanwhile let us enjoy the last year of Archbishop Sentamu's time with us giving thanks for many inspirational times. **Paul**

What's Happening at Roseberry School in Darjeeling

It is 2 years since I last visited Darjeeling, so I expected some changes at Roseberry, but nothing could have prepared me for the massive developments which have taken place since then.



Where our much loved but earthquake damaged old wooden building once stood, a beautifully finished modern building now faces the yard. Inside, I find a light and airy space divided by low shelving into different carpeted "rooms" each occupied by a teacher with a group of children enjoying a story, or singing, or practising drawing English letters on small chalk boards. The room is bright and colourful and the atmosphere one of order and purpose. The little 3 year olds only joined the nursery 6 weeks earlier but are already learning how to behave in a school setting.

Later in the week I am asked to cut the tape for a ceremonial opening of the new building. Fellow Trustee Sarah and I are honoured with traditional silk khadas and bunches of flowers as well as cards made by the children. We are joined by two of our very first pupils while groups of children sing and dance for us and the teachers look on proudly.



It is a very emotional occasion for me as I remember back to the day in 2007 (left), when I first met Manoj and Dipesh as 4 year olds (at the back of the line) Now they are assured teenagers with charming manners and a much brighter future.

The rest of the week is a whirlwind of meetings with the staff, and with a stream of ex-pupils who come to catch up with the news. I visit all the classes and find the whole building looking very spruce and well loved after a big spring clean. Sarah finds the standard of teaching much improved and helps those who are struggling.



Our enthusiastic but mostly untrained staff are developing valuable skills which are rare in a society which equates harsh and humourless with good teaching. The oldest of our ex-pupils have just sat their Class 10 exams, the equivalent of our GCSE exams. Having done well enough to qualify for a further two years in school, they will take their class 12 exams in 2021, another important landmark in the story of Roseberry School. It will be so interesting to see how they fare once they are out in the world of work.

Thy Kingdom Come 2019

The Archbishops of Canterbury and York once again invited worshipping communities to join together to pray "Thy Kingdom Come" in the time between Ascension Day and Pentecost – along with churches from over 65 different denominations in 114 countries around the world.

Here in Great Ayton an ecumenical group met to make plans to enable people to join together in All Saints Church, in three very different daily prayer streams, to pray "Thy Kingdom Come". To become part of a wave of prayer across the UK and around the world praying for people we know to come to know Jesus.



Why All Saints ??

It is the building which provides the foundation for the Christian Church in Great Ayton – it predates the formation of different denominations; it is part of our common heritage.



We were blessed with overall good weather !! All Saints opened for the early morning 7.30am prayer slot and its doors remained open wide until after 4pm daily. The quiet of the 7.30am prayer time was accompanied by glorious birdsong - if there was no need to rush off to work or other commitments after the organised prayer time then the opportunity was there to linger in the peace for a while longer...

The I2 noon prayer slot included a solo piece of music offered as part of the prayer – (Ewan Murray's good idea) Meg and Chris Gilbert from G'bro. Christian Fellowship were our musicians and leaders on day one and as the days progressed guitar, flute, key-board,

banjo, harmonium, solo singers and poetry accompanied the prayer slots - along with the bird song and the sounds of the freedom of Marwood School children at play. Thanks to all who were able to come and take part and to those who led/guided this time from Methodist, Anglican and Tees-side Jubilee Church.

From 3pm – 4pm All Saints took on a new shape for families to come along after school to enjoy storytelling, singing, snacks and crafts – all following the daily prayer theme and as with all of the prayer slots including saying Thy Kingdom Come prayer and the Lord's Prayer together. Adult helpers from each of the local churches joined the rota for this session – a bonus to meet and have time to talk together as the children enjoyed their activities.





During the ten days 378 people attended the organised slots and as the church remained open people were free to call in at other times. Fifty-six people left prayers on the Prayer Tree and many more tied Prayer Ribbons to the railings along the High Street. The ribbons of prayer and the cards from the tree were taken to the Churches Together service at St Margaret's Church - 4pm on Pentecost Sunday - and offered to God during that time of worship, prayer and fellowship together.

A host of trophies were presented at the end, to the delight of many proud parents, and all the competitors joined together with a grand finale that nearly blew the roof off.


There were lots of young people from bands in County Durham, and perhaps next year more local brass players may take part.


Crowds gather around the astronomical clock in the main
