

A Word from the Vicar



We have come to the end of a very full, busy and varied year with lots going on.

Great Ayton is still a fairly traditional Parish where the community call upon us for the Occasional Offices of Baptisms 17 (22), Weddings 9 (10) and Funerals 52 (39) (2018 figures in brackets). Several of our baptisms and weddings opt for our sister Church in the Benefice of Saint

Oswald's, so figures move rather than decline. Funerals however were very much up, and whilst we lost 7 members of the Congregation in 2019 it was heartening to see the Average Sunday attendance show a slight increase to 112 (109) adults and 20 (19) children. This is largely due to new initiatives in Café Church, Non Eucharistic Parade Services, summer services in All Saints and work throughout the week from young to old with Little Fishes Toddler Service to the Coffee Lounge Communion for Senior Citizens. There was also a Confirmation Service during the year that saw 11 candidates from the Benefice confirmed in a moving service in Church. Several of the young people are involved in Church activities from choir, serving to bell ringing.

Whilst the Electoral Roll reduced from 284 to 218, this was mainly due to the renewal process and losing people who had moved on since joining several years ago.

The year was also marked with several teaching events and courses to help deepen people's faith, which were well received.

Thy Kingdom Come from Ascension to Pentecost was marked in All Saints Church – the former Parish Church – had brought together Christians in the village of all ages for the times of prayer throughout the day. The Churches continue to meet together for Unity week, Easter, Pentecost and Remembrance as well as distributing details of services for Easter and Christmas together in a card throughout the village.

Easter attendance was up this year 246 (227) and Communicants almost the same 157 (160) and at Christmas we once again saw good attendances at the Christmas Carol Services in the run up to Christmas of 1,107 whilst Christmas Eve and Day were 460 (475). The number attending Communion Services continues a pattern of slow decline 176 (191) as attendance at Midnight Mass does not draw people as once it did. They are still good numbers regardless.

Our Church has continued supporting others through the support we give to other Charities, especially *Middlesbrough Foodbank* and *Together Middlesbrough and Cleveland*, and our PCC Giving to support Christian Charities and Churches working in difficult areas.

As well as our regular work with children in the Parish through Sunday School and Little Fishes, I also take weekly assemblies in Marwood Church of England School who also hold one per half term in Church that is open to anyone to attend. We have maintained our support for the school with a full complement of Foundation Governors, replacing one who became school secretary during the year.

Moving Safeguarding forward in the Parish has been а high priority with the Safeguarding Officer ensuring people undertake the necessary training. I attended Safeguarding Training Sessions in 2019 and other Staff Members



have done similar. We work hard to ensure we have a safe environment for those in our care, and have also displayed posters in the Hall toilets with advice for Hall users who may be in abusive situations and where to go for help.

The PCC met regularly to discharge its duties and the Church Officers kept a close eye on both finance and the fabric of the Church with plans for both in 2020.

Lots of things happen week by week by a whole host of people to keep the Church and its buildings and activities running. My thanks to all of them, and to all the Church Officers and the Parish Staff who assist. We are fortunate in having a Reader in training and in 2020 are being given a Curate to train. We will also be assisting more at Stokesley parish entering a period of vacancy.

A good year with lots to be thankful for, and plenty of challenges ahead for the future.

1. Minutes of the last meeting 21st March 2018

- The minutes of last year's Annual Parochial Church Meeting had been circulated with the Annual Report.
- The minutes were proposed by Gordon Wood, seconded by Robin Harmar. All in agreement.

2. Matters Arising

There were no matters arising.

3. Electoral Roll Report

- Alison Lambert reported that following the complete renewal of the electoral roll for 2019, which closed on 4th March, the number appearing on the Roll is now 218.
- Although this is lower than previous years, it is not as low as originally feared.
- Unfortunately, there are still a significant number of Church members who are not on the Roll, particularly younger members.
- Applications for enrolment can be accepted after the conclusion of the Annual Meeting and throughout the year not just at the Annual Revision.
- After 13 years, Alison is stepping down as Electoral Roll officer.
 Vicki Nath has agreed to take over the role and the roll. The
 Vicar thanked Alison on behalf of the meeting for all her work.

4. Presentation of Annual Report for 2018

- The Annual report for 2018 has been published and distributed in several formats.
- There is a tremendous amount of work that goes on in the church and thanks were given to all those who have contributed their written words to the Annual Report and for all the work that they carry out voluntarily during the year to make Christ Church such a successful church.
- Formal adoption of the report was proposed by Peter Prunty and seconded by Jonathan Winterschladen. Agreed by all present.

5. Financial Report and Presentation of Audited Accounts for year ended 31st December 2018

- Ken Taylor presented the financial report for the year ending 31st December 2018 – full details of the income and expenditure are available in the Annual Report.
- Highlights of the year included the Hall renovation project, numerous music concerts at the culmination of the organ restoration project and the "From Thankfulness To Generosity" teaching.
- Income and expenditure in respect of the Church General funds ended with a deficit of £2970.
- Planned giving is down by around £5,000 on the year however this was partly offset by a donation from St Oswald's and a couple of legacies.
- Our reserves now stand at £35,244 which equates to approximately 3-4 months operating costs.

- Church Hall project benefitted from £108,925 in grants and the Gift Day raised £19,139. Total spend was £139,816.
- Charitable giving has continued at a high level £31,839 was distributed to 56 charities throughout the year.
- The top Charities were: Genesis Project (£3,211), Children in Distress, Yorkshire Cancer Research, Herriot Hospice Homecare, The Children's Society and Zoe's Place.
- Details of the Budget for 2019-2020 were given:
- Income is budgeted as £134,000.
- Expenditure is balanced at £134,000 to include a Freewill Offering to the Diocese of £90,840 as agreed at the October PCC meeting.
- Mission giving has been reduced to help balance expenditure, however, it was agreed by PCC that this will be reviewed later in the year.
- The PCC agreed at their last meeting that this budget be submitted for approval at this Annual Meeting.
- Ken thanked everyone who is signed up to the planned giving scheme.
- He also expressed his thanks to Helen Dickinson, Ynez and John Clarke, Jean Goat, Robin Harmar and all the sidespeople for helping to look after the money.
- Ken reminded everyone of the easy fundraising app that people can sign up to and help raise money.
- The card reader is now up and running in church.
- The Vicar said a very big thank you to Ken Taylor for all his work on the
 accounts he is a very efficient treasurer and carries out his role in what
 appears to be an effortless manner! Thanks to Ken and his team who
 help him.
- Helen Land proposed adoption of the signed accounts seconded by Alison Lambert. All in agreement.

6. The Vicar's comments

- Baptisms -22. Although this figure is up on the previous year, Christenings are generally on a downward trend. Thanks were expressed to the team who make them all run so smoothly clergy, sidespeople and anniversary card distributors.
- Weddings 9. Paul has started to attend wedding fairs again, however due to the promotion of the outdoor ceremony area at Whinstone View and closure of Angrove Park, we have found numbers going down, but we are on the case and promoting Church weddings. Paul expressed his thanks to the team, musicians and vergers.
- Funerals 27 in church and II crematorium services which is dropping drastically due to out of village funeral directors having their own

- celebrants taking services at crematoriums. We offer a good service and have excellent relations with the associated businesses in the village ie Funeral Directors, Florists and Caterers.
- Fees to the Diocese from Great Ayton were £7914, which, when added to Newton's totalled £9692. Ayton's Fees in 2017 were £8165.
- Thanks was expressed to everyone involved in the different groups associated with church. Little Fishes has recently celebrated its 8th Birthday. WLTDO? Is still going well and Come & Praise is well attended.
- Sunday School Karen soldiers on with Sunday School but really needs someone to help share the work. There will be no Good Friday workshop this year.
- There have been lots of special services during the year including WWI anniversaries, Bishop John's visit, Charity Auction, and a very special Praise and Party which was joined with the official Church Hall opening!
- Attendance figures have remained steady with an average adult attendance of 109 and children 21.
- The Foodbank has been very well supported including the donations from the Pantomime.
- A very big highlight was the wonderful poppy display which really brightened up the village and made a huge impact with photographs in National newspapers. The service drew a huge crowd of people and it was very moving.
- Social media also enables the Church to reach a wider audience through Twitter, Facebook, the website and Spire, which has now moved to Mail Chimp to comply with GDPR and is making life much easier for Paul to distribute.
- The Church Hall renovation has made a huge difference to the community, the improvements are remarkable. Paul gave a special thanks to Robin and the team involved for all the hard work.
- Ewan has been with us just over a year and although he has been a
 delight to have, the end of his time here is on the horizon as he wants
 to further his career. He will be greatly missed when he goes.
- Paul expressed his thanks to all the Parish staff, some of whom had celebrated special anniversaries last year.
- There are 4 members who are stepping down, Rob Pepper is not standing again as Churchwarden, Anna Wilson is stepping down as secretary after 2 years, Alison Lambert is stepping down as electoral roll officer after 13 years and Enid Sedgwick is retiring from PCC after 12 years. All were thanked for their contributions and they will continue to play a part in the life of our Church.
- Marwood School said goodbye to Celia Wilson as Headteacher as she moved to be an Advisor with the Diocese. After acting as interim

Headteacher since summer, Dorothy Walton has now been appointed as the new Headteacher. Julie Bourke has also retired as Secretary and Alison Lambert has taken over her role. Marwood has continued its excellent standard and maintains a really strong bond with our church.

- On the agenda for the future is a programme of groups that Geoff has compiled.
- Confirmation is booked for 30th June at 6pm, the 9.15am Parish Communion will be cancelled and we shall include Communion with the Confirmation.
- All Saints Church to be revitalised with extra prayer and worship activities as well as concerts.
- Find ways of keeping the church at the heart of the community, including more 20 - 40's.
- Paul thanked all the Parish Staff, Church Officers and everyone involved in our Church who do so much for our church life.

Rev'd Geoff Jaques, now over 70, no longer holds a license but has the Archbishop's Permission to Officiate. This means that he is not automatically on the PCC but can be co-opted by the Annual Meeting on an annual basis. This was proposed by Rev'd Jon Dean and accepted unanimously.

7. Election of Deanery Synod Representatives I

- The Vicar asked if there was anyone who wished to be nominated for the Deanery Synod, there were none.
- There remains one vacancy on the Deanery Synod.

8. Election of Parochial Church Council members - 7 vacancies

- There are 7 vacancies on the PCC there had been five vacancies during the year and the term of membership ended for Robin Harmar and David Oliver. Mark Stowell has also resigned from PCC.

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Churchwardens' Report

We have continued general maintenance to the fabric of Christ Church and All Saints Church. The lead on both roofs has been marked with smart water to deter thieves. Plans are in place to re-surface the car park behind Christ Church and install a bike rack. The outside doors of Christ Church will be painted later this year. A consultation process is also in place to improve and update the lighting in Christ Church.

The congregation can continue to be reassured that the church silver and other items of value continue to be kept safely and securely, and records continue to be updated as required.

There are a large group of people working behind the scenes who enable our church to function smoothly, and ensure our services are welcoming, and that the church looks beautiful. They include the volunteer cleaners, sides-people, flower arrangers, and those who serve coffee, and we wish to thank them for all their hard work.

Financial Report 2019



2019 was a successful year for the Church finances, thanks to a couple of very generous legacies, which left our reserves healthier than for many years.

Unrestricted income rose from £134,035 in 2018 to £157,844 this year while unrestricted expenditure fell from £139,108 to £135,141. This resulted in the balance in our general funds rising from £35,244 to £60,050

We were very pleased to receive legacies from the estates of Margaret Herriman and Hilary Stemp totalling

£15,000, with the request that they may be used for the upkeep of the church. Also during the year we made our final claim on the Heritage Lottery Fund Grant we received for the church hall project – after settling all the outstanding expenses on the project, we were able to transfer a balance of £4,918 to general funds. It was also pleasing that we had a number of new additions to our roll of planned givers which, along with the increased donations of several existing members, resulted in planned giving rising from £82,791 to £87,629. After a 6 month trial period, we have now introduced a card reader to enable donations, mostly at baptisms and funerals, to be made by debit or credit card. To date over £300 has been raised this way. So overall our general income was the highest it has been for many years

The reduction in expenditure can largely be attributed to the fact that maintenance and repair costs were at a very low level. Your PCC has, however, decided that two major fabric issues need to be addressed. Firstly the rear car park desperately needs attention- access via the link passage is necessary for wheelchairs and other church users without carrying mud through onto the church carpets! Two quotations have been received for re-surfacing this area which is planned to be carried out in the spring. It has also been considered for some time that the church lighting is not only inadequate in many areas but is provided by high cost metal halide and tungsten lights. We therefore propose to carry out a detailed study into the feasibility of changing to more eco-friendly LED lights and also to provide focussed lighting in key areas of the church eg altar, lectern, pulpit etc. The receipt of the legacies received this year will go some way towards financing these schemes. Expenditure in other areas of church life remained close to the budget for the year.

For 2019 the PCC decided that our contribution to the Diocesan Common Fund should remain at £90,840. However for 2020, it was agreed to increase our freewill offering by above the level of inflation to £94,440. We also decided to maintain

our mission giving from general funds at £10,000. Our recent practice of encouraging recommendations from members of the congregation was continued, and we again supported a number of local and national Christian-based charities.

During the year we ran two appeals. In the spring, we supported Tear Fund in their recovery efforts following the devastating Cyclone Idai in East Africa and raised a

total of £1,700. The Christmas appeal this year focussed Together Middlesbrough Cleveland. an umbrella charity which provides support in many ways (including the food bank) to needy families in



poorer areas of Teesside. Overall, our mission giving from funerals and weddings, special services, appeals, and donations from general funds reached the excellent total of £31,730 distributed among 45 different charities.

Thanks to a programme of additional services, concerts and other fundraising activities, the finances of All Saints church improved significantly with reserves rising to a more comfortable level of £2,550 by the year end. The more regular use of All Saints will ensure that this village gem has a sustainable future.

The Church Hall was back in full use after the major renovation and 2019 saw a rise in the number of groups using the hall particularly for private functions and fundraising events - as a result we had a healthy bank balance of £2,737 at the year end

The PCC continues to operate a policy of maintaining reserves at the equivalent of 3-4 months operating costs

As always, I am extremely grateful to the efforts of our finance team - John & Ynez Clarke, Helen Dickinson, Jean Goat, Robin Harmar and all the sidespeople – for helping to ensure that the finances of the church are kept in good order!

All Saints Church



It was something of a transformative year for All Saints after the sub-committee discussed ways and means of rectifying a year on year worsening financial situation. This resulted in a very deliberate attempt to increase the profile of All Saints through exposure in local newspapers and magazines and a conscious effort to increase the use of the church through the summer months. This was done by having more services, weekly communion and several evening worships, but most notably via an

informal prayer and music event coinciding with Pentecost, organised by representatives from different churches and attended by over 400 people during a ten day period. The latter was not primarily a fundraising event but succeeded in showing that the church is much more than just an historic building and can be of benefit to the wider community. We also received two people into the church on the day before their funerals, the short services providing a very moving experience for the families concerned.

Finances were helped in various ways, through donations from two concerts in Christ Church, collections from an increased number of services and legacies, and the Treasurer reported annual income at the highest level he could remember.

As a result of the publicity we recruited three new guides and this impacted favourably on the coverage of duties. For the first time in the six years since I became Custodian we have more guides heading into the new season than the previous year. Daily visitor numbers, as usual including some enjoyable group visits, held up well at around 1200 but including all the services and special events our total footfall was significantly higher, at over 2000.

The only repairs needed in relation to the church were as a result of part of the north cemetery wall collapsing but as the churchyard and perimeter are part of the District Council's responsibility they bore the considerable cost of this reinstatement work and I would like to thank Hambleton Council for their speedy response.

We are also in negotiation with the Council regarding the replacement of the front gates and have obtained estimates from several local tradesmen.

From a security angle the lead on the roof has been given a renewed treatment of 'Smartwater'. The only other issue to be reported is that we became aware of the porch being used on a regular basis after dark by a gathering of young persons and whilst this was not causing major damage or intrusion it did necessitate regular sweep ups and so eventually it was decided to involve the police in a low key monitoring role.

Looking ahead we need to build on the progress made in 2019. Some of last year's events will be repeated and a concert by a Spanish classical guitarist is scheduled in July. Amongst other initiatives we are also looking into the possibility of setting up a 'Friends of All Saints' scheme for those interested in helping All Saints to remain on a solid financial footing.

Safeguarding



This year David Fox has continued in post as Safeguarding Officer and Anna Wilson as assistant Safeguarding Officer. To the end of December 2019, all those currently in role, working with children or vulnerable adults, as part of the parish's activities, have been DBS checked to the appropriate level. This includes 45 members of our Church community.

This year, the leaders of the various groups have encouraged, supported by the Safeguarding Officer, their workers to take Diocese of York

safeguarding courses C0 & C1 online. David has visited several applicants at home to enable them to complete the courses. To date, 29 have taken and passed the C0 course and another 15 have completed the C1 course. This is an ongoing process. The appropriate leaders of church activities that include children and vulnerable adults have been encouraged to take the C2 course at various course



centres around the diocese: this has included 6 successful participants.

In 2020 our focus will be on:

- I) encouraging the remainder of our volunteers to complete C0 and C1 Diocesan safeguarding courses online.
- 2) developing risk assessments for children's activities at Christ Church.

Stokesley Deanery Synod



In 2019 the Parish was represented by Nick Land, John Dickinson and Rosemary Wheway. There is one vacancy and the clergy also attend.

There were three meetings in 2019 held at various venues in the Deanery. Apart from the business of information sharing and financial necessities the meetings begin with an informative

talk and any member of the congregation can attend the talk and stay, as an observer, for the business meeting.

In February there was a presentation from the Diocesan Generous Giving Team led by Jo Beacroft- Mitchell who introduced David Smallwood and Sammi Tooze. They offered advice and support to PCCs to help regular givers to see where their contribution goes.

In June we welcomed Revd John Lee and Dr Ben Walker from the 20s to 40s team. Churches are being challenged to try something new with support from the team.

In October we had a presentation led by the new Dean of York Minster, Rt Revd Dr Jonathan Frost. This was based on the Diocesan strategy of Reach, Grow and Sustain.

Each year the Deanery organises four Lent services. In 2019 these were held in Christ Church and were led by Bishop David Welbourne. He was very inspiring and covered a variety of topics in his very easy manner. Each session ended with a short act of worship.

Christ Church Visitors

We are currently a group of 19 who visit 20 people on a regular basis and, we hope, make a difference to their lives and spiritual growth. There are more housebound and/or elderly people in our parish who would benefit from this service so more volunteers are always welcome. Sometimes we visit for a short time, for instance, following a stay in hospital until someone is able to return to church. Since we began in November 2005 we have made contact with 160 people.

We continue to meet regularly with the clergy so that they can monitor our visits and we review our guidelines annually. We have had training in dementia awareness and end of life care and have become a registered Dementia Friendly Church.



Our aim is to visit anyone in the village in need – the housebound, lonely, sick and infirm – but this does not exclusively mean those who were

regular churchgoers. We visit people mostly in their own homes but several of those visited eventually move out of the village to Care Homes and our Visitors travel as far as Catterick as well as Stokesley, Middlesbrough, Eaglescliffe, Northallerton and Guisborough to stay in touch. We also visit hospitals if this is appropriate.



The group supports the monthly and Christmas Coffee Lounge services and also transports some of the people who would otherwise be unable to attend. These are open to **anyone** who appreciates a **weekday afternoon service**.

In 2019 we hosted our eighth Praise and Party service followed by tea in the Hall. This attracted many for whom the 9.15 service is just too early.

Everyone appreciated both the "praise" and the "party" and we hope to host a similar event in 2020. We took a selection of food after the party to 13 people who were unable to attend. This was warmly welcomed.

We continue to deliver cards on the first anniversary of a bereavement and also a Welcome Pack whenever we see a removal van in the village. Please tell us if you know someone who would like a visit or you have new neighbours who would like a Welcome Pack but more importantly **join us if you can!**

A whole day for reflection was set aside for us at Holy Trinity church, North Ormesby in September, led by Rev'd Jonathan Cooper. In the quiet of the church and its cloistered garden it was hard to believe there was a busy market day going on outside!

Between Ascension Day and Pentecost our Archbishops Welby and Sentamu asked churches to pray for God's Kingdom to 'come on earth as it is in heaven'. 'Thy Kingdom Come' prayer events were held daily in All Saints Church at 8.00am, 12 noon and from 3-4 pm.

"Prayers the Sentamu Way" moved into All Saints, as 'Thy Kingdom Come' finished, for what turned out to be the most glorious summer months. We returned to Christ Church in September, where we continue to meet on Thursday mornings from 9.30-10 am. We use a simple pattern of prayer taught by Archbishop

Sentamu - you are welcome to come and be part of the group any Thursday morning.

The Rev'd Mel King led a Quiet Morning at Friends Meeting House in March and returned to Great Ayton to give a teaching day on Centering Prayer at Christ Church in November.

Two ladies from The World Community of Christian Meditation led an inspiring morning at St. Margaret's church in June.



Each of these were organised by the ecumenical contemplative prayer group – guided by Ann Browne, who continue to meet weekly for prayer on Wednesday afternoons.

Marwood Church Of England Infant School continues to thrive in every way.



2019 has been another busy year for Marwood. We have seen the number of children on roll increase, said goodbye to some much-loved staff and governors and appointed Dorothy Walton as Headteacher, whilst working hard to further develop the school's Christian ethos.

Mrs Walton has taught at Marwood School for over 14 years; during that time, she has built strong relationships

with all stakeholders and has acquired a good overview of the priorities to move the school forward. She has already taken steps to secure the school's excellent academic performance but most importantly has focused her energy on ensuring that Marwood is a place where children are well cared for, motivated to learn and where strong Christian values are celebrated.

In February, Julie Bourke announced she was retiring from her role as School Secretary and Clerk to the Governors and then Debbie Hutchinson retired in July as Higher Level Teaching Assistant. It is always sad to say goodbye and especially so when the people



leaving are very special to us. We are so very grateful to Julie, Debbie and Helen Land, (who also departed after many



years supporting the school as a governor) all of whom have left their indelible mark on Marwood School. The school is thrilled that both Julie and Debbie have continued to help the school on a voluntary basis.

In March, Alison Lambert was appointed to the role of School Secretary and later in the year, we welcomed two new teaching assistants, Cathrine Gale-Sau as a HLTA and Vicky Gawthorpe as TA. David Fox joined the

school in September as a Foundation Governor, as Alison takes on the role of Clerk to the Governors after 5 years as a Foundation Governor.

Providing Strong Christian Values



The staff and governors have been building on the foundations of last year's 'Outstanding' OFSTED self evaluation and 'Excellent' SIAMS report, ensuring that the school's chosen Christian values of 'Love, Friendship and Forgiveness' are firmly embedded into every aspect of school life. To this end, the children, staff and foundation governors enjoyed a whole day focusing on these values by doing a carousel of

activities, involving art to go on display in the worship room, dance, singing and storytelling, culminating in a collective worship when the children were able to articulate what they had learned and how they were going to express their learning in daily school life.

At Marwood, we take great pride in the work that we do linked to church, our local community and the wider global community. Earlier in the year, the pupils produced bible story pictures for the Church Hall. After the Harvest Festival, the children distributed boxes of food to the elderly people of Great Ayton.

Introducing Trinity Group...

This year we have started Trinity Group aimed at developing the childrens' understanding of the Holy Trinity, increasing their awareness of the issues facing our global community and inspiring courageous advocates for the future. The children have made wooden crosses for use outdoors, designed the outdoor spiritual area, The Sacred Place, made bead crosses to sell during Christian



Aid Week and have raised funds for Water Aid by wearing Christmas jumpers. We have also recently enrolled for the Christian Aid Global Neighbours' Award (Bronze). Alongside these activities, the whole school has also been involved in other charitable giving, participating in the Love in a Box Appeal, Red Nose Day and gaining a Bronze Award in the Woodland Trust's Green Tree School Scheme.

The Sacred Place



Building on the excellent SIAMS report and having received a very generous donation from members of the local community, we have developed an outside area for quiet contemplation and reflection. The children voted for the name of the new timber shelter and garden: The Sacred Place. Decorated with wall murals that were painted by a former pupil and Trinity Group members, The Sacred Place provides cover from the elements and space where the children can pray, sit quietly and appreciate nature.

The Nativity Service

Our annual nativity play performance is a key focus for the children's appreciation of the nativity story, as well as focusing on key Christian values in terms of the production chosen. This year we enjoyed a superbly acted and very sincerely performed play called 'Babushka' – the incredibly high standard of previous years was again matched by the whole school and, in particular,



the joy exhibited in their singing was wonderful to experience. The play focused on an old lady who had previously always been too busy with life's pressures to stop and listen to God; the outcome truly cemented our core values at Marwood, showing that friendship was limited without opening up your heart to God's love.

Worship

Each day, worship continues to be at the heart of the children's day: once a week Rev Pev leads worship, but on the other days staff members take the role. The content is robust in its Christian values, yet also inclusive and affirming of all the children's values, regardless of their beliefs. Some very heartfelt worship songs set the extremely positive and receptive mood and the children are not only engaged, but also very involved in the rituals,

singing, prayer and many take pre-prepared or ad hoc positions of leadership, speaking to their peers candidly, confidently and in detail about their own moral codes and spiritual experiences.

Again, half termly services of celebration are held at Christ Church, attended by parents, which gives us a real opportunity to expand our worship experiences, music and achievements in the wider community of parents and friends of the school.

Marwood continues to be an outstanding centre for Christian witness, both to its pupils and their families, but also to the wider community. As such, we warmly invite you to attend one or more of the half termly worship services at Christ church, so you can see for yourselves what an asset the school is to our village.

9.15am Parish Communion Our Parish Communion remains the largest weekly act of worship still attracting around a hundred worshippers each Sunday, including the Sunday School. Our Choir attend each week and we are treated to a different anthem. Christ Church also benefits from a variety of preachers and we have many people at the front assisting. Going and taking services elsewhere is a reminder to me never to take this all for granted as we are most fortunate, We need to have confidence in inviting others to join us. The Parade Services follow a non Eucharistic format and finishes by I 0am to allow young people to attend other commitments. Our service always concludes with Coffee

Sunday Evening Specials We enjoy many specials throughout the year including Memorial Services, Songs of Praise, Love in a Box, Christingles and several Carol Services, and in 2019 we added to these with several successful evening services in All Saints Church including 3 Taize style services as well as an Opening and Closing Songs of Praise



Christenings/ Baptisms Christenings reduced from twenty-two in 2018 to seventeen. Colleagues report similar reductions in numbers. Many Christenings come to us from wedding couples with whom we already have a relationship.

Weddings Weddings down by I to 9, but I8 overall in the Benefice, the same as 2018. We are being squeezed by wedding venues hosting Outdoor Ceremonies and the opening of Sneaton Castle with its Chapel as a wedding venue will also have its effect. Nevertheless we are out there encouraging folk to come to us

Funerals You hardly want to show an increase in funerals but this has gone from 38 in 2018 to 52 in 2019, and with an incredibly busy start to 2020. 30 Funerals came into Church. We try and move with the times with all our services and make them positive occasions that show the love of God for all. In 2019 we saw the introduction of a Contactless Giving Station in Church.

Growing Together 2019



Two groups explored Being Christian led by Diocesan Lay Development Adviser (Angela Bailey) on Friday mornings in February and Monday evenings in June. Each of the sessions on Baptism, Bible, Eucharist & Prayer led to lively discussions.

Lesley Miller organised several sessions of the BRF 'Parenting for Faith' where anybody involved in parenting (grandparents, aunts and uncles as well as parents!) met to share what it really is in practice. We struggled to find a good time – trying Tuesday

mornings after Fishes and different evenings – eventually recognising that gathering folk together may not be the best way of supporting parenting.

Thank God it's Monday! Nick Land led a couple of sessions to help us explore 'working with God at work' He also introduced us to This Time Tomorrow during our intercessions at a number of our 9:15 services.

Our Tuesday evening Discipleship Group which began in 2015 as an Adult Confirmation group continued to meet monthly using Carl Laferton's 'Spiritual Health Check' and as discussion starters. A fortnightly home group has begun on Wednesday evenings.





In May, New Daylight contributor Tony Horsfall led a morning exploring 'Faith that persists to the finishing line'. We looked at the example of Jesus as an inspiration for our own resilience; then considered a very moving story from the life of David when he found himself at his lowest point to help us learn how to find strength from God.

Rev'd Jonathan Cooper led a Reflective Away Day for us in September at Holy Trinity, North Ormesby using images of Birds in the Psalms to give us the opportunity to look at them and illuminate our spiritual growth.

An amazing number of folk were prompted by God to join us at All Saints during the 10 days from Ascension to Pentecost - truly Spirit inspired.

Each of the prayer streams developed its own character, particular thanks to John Dickinson, Enid Sedgwick and Rosemary Wheway who have shaped the 7.30am, midday and 3.00 to 4.00pm respectively. Without them the streams would not have flowed.

Thanks to our 11 musicians, 10 storytellers, 16 readers, 21 prayer leaders, 9 snack providers - to all from across the village Christian community (Anglicans, Methodists, New Frontiers, Romans, Society of Friends) who have each given their time & skills to shape each aspect of our programme.

Whilst numbers aren't everything, they do make interesting reading. The total attendance over the 10 days was at least 378 (59 under 20, 56 aged 20 to 49 and 263 aged 50+]. Individual streams ranged from 4 to 43 - each day was different.



All Saints was open each day so others will have called in to pray at different times and haven't been recorded. 56 folk left prayers on the Prayer Tree; these were offered at the well attended United Pentecost Service in St Margaret's. We have scattered a significant amount of seed, each of us praying for our 5 people throughout the 10 days. God will bring the harvest to fruition. We then have the responsibility of gathering it in.

It was encouraging to see Christians from across the community working together; many experienced real 'moments' at some stage during the 10 days; a number of people appeared to have 'grown' - praying, leading, singing.
