Prayer Report



“Through our lives and by our prayer, may your kingdom come”
During March an unprecedented change for the world unfolded as the Covid 19 crisis spread. With the closure of our church building prayer from our own homes and during “exercise walks” developed new life. Our personal prayers and thoughtfulness from our own homes continue to be a daily way of loving and caring for others.

Paul quickly established a daily “Prayer for the Day” on Zoom at 8.45am Monday to Saturday. Fifteen minutes spent together, with prayers, a psalm, a short reading and a Thought for the Day ending with the Lord’s Prayer. This began with about eight regular attenders but now nurtures on average 50 – 60 people per day, including catch up on the website and Facebook.

Our church building has been able to open for prayer at appointed times during the past year. The poppy display during Oct/Nov and the Memory Tree and Crib in December both provided focus points.

Before Covid on March 6 the well-attended “World Day of Prayer” service, organised by Angela Jaques and a team from each of the village churches went ahead as scheduled in St Margaret’s church. The service had been prepared by Christian women of Zimbabwe and was used by 120 countries and islands from around the world as they each took part during the 24 hour cycle of prayer.

March 14 was Christ Church “Open Day” – organised as part of our response to the York Diocese “Come and See” initiative. During this time seven interactive Prayer Stations based on the Lord’s Prayer were set up in church. Throughout the day, on the hour, there was a short time of prayer together.



On the days between Ascension Day (21 May) and Pentecost Sunday (30 May) our Archbishops once again called for everyone to pray for God’s Kingdom to come into the lives of people around us. Prayer journals published specifically for this time were available. Many people made prayer ribbons visible outside their homes as reminders of prayer for our chosen five.

The Sentamu Prayer Group are in touch with each other regularly. We are an ‘open’ group who continue to use the Sentamu prayer pattern at least weekly to pray for the world, friends, family and each other.

Ann Browne who guided the ecumenical contemplative prayer group invited the Canon Christopher Collingwood, Chancellor of York Minster to speak on Zen Openness and to spend time in meditation together. His visit was well attended when it took place on 20 February in Christ Church coffee lounge.

Ann died on 21 May. She was indeed a prayer warrior and is missed. Her prayer group continue their pattern of regular contemplative prayer times on Monday evenings at 7.30pm and Wednesday afternoons at 4.00pm in their own homes. In September a Zoom meeting with Terry Doyle was organised by our group and well supported. (Terry is a long time practitioner and teacher of meditation, now employed in Middlesbrough working with the marginalised.)



In Nov / Dec. some of our group took part in a series of evening Zoom sessions for the season of Advent with Rev. Mel King which attracted people locally and from other countries.

Our claim to fame is that we are the oldest rural Branch in the country. We were founded in 1963 at the request of the Coroner because of his concerns at the high suicide rate in the farming community. Sadly that statistic is unchanged. Amongst the founding fathers were Alf Wight (James Herriot) and his partner Donald Sinclair (Siegfried Farnham).



We now cover 1200 square miles of North Yorkshire, from Hawes to Helmsley and south of the Tees, from Piercebridge to the villages just north of Easingwold. Beautiful country, a scattered population, in excess of 200,000, and a lot of sheep!

We are part of our Central London based Charity, who own our premises. However we receive no income from them, and are required to be financially independent with our annual running costs. These are currently in the region of £14,500, and have to be met totally by occasional donations, our annual street collections and fundraising, none of which has been possible this year due to Covid.

Our purpose is to support anyone who finds themselves in emotional distress and struggling to cope with their lives. Our service is confidential and non judgemental, we do not give advice, but we hope that by talking or via email our callers may find a way through their problems.

Our small Branch, which does not have enough volunteers to be open all the time, took well over 14,760 calls last year either, over the telephone or via email. The need sadly is enormous. Mental Health support is often not available around the clock, and those struggling are told by their mental health workers to call us if they cannot reach their crisis line.

When Covid reared its ugly head the Government deemed us an Essential Service from the onset of the first lock down. The NHS had the foresight to ask us to open a dedicated line for their front line workers, this was done in record time, and some of those calls are truly harrowing to take.

We know that Covid has increased the demand for our service, it has exacerbated the mental health of those with pre existing conditions, and caused a great many new reactive mental health problems.

Prisoners for the most part, for their own safety, are locked up in cells often 12' by 6', for 23 hours a day. All their education, most of their employment on and off site, and recreation suddenly stopped, inevitably with huge mental health repercussions.

Self harm, abuse both physical and psychological, relationship problems, loneliness, unemployment, financial problems and real poverty are all on the rise due to Covid, our calls are both draining and exhausting, and often so very sad to hear.

Last year 6,859 people died by suicide in the UK and ROI, of these 5,185 were men and 1,674 were women. Our research provides the Government with some of their figures.

It is of course too early to say whether the actual suicide rate will have risen this year, though it is predicted that may well be the case.

They took him to the Sacred Space and sang a beautiful prayer to him as they explained what that space was all about.

He took the wicker basket with the items in and posed for a typical budget



day shot for them. All then into All Saints Churchyard where David Fox had been installing bird boxes and Rishi assisted in putting the last one up. They all paid attention to why they face North West,

to avoid the cold winds and the heat of the sun.





The group then went to a teaching circle where he did a question and answer session with the children who asked him all about his job, who he worked with, did he enjoy it and why did he choose to be an Member of Parliament. Positive answers came for all the questions and he told the children he wanted to make a difference for the good, as he was sure they would too.

Amazingly by now he knew the names of all the children who had a great time.

He wrote a special message for them in their book to remember his visit.



It was a cold morning, but the smiles were there all round. To think that with all that is going on in our country at the moment and all the extra responsibilities Rishi has in Government, that he could make time for such visits, and make them so memorable and enjoyable, is a great credit to him.

He was given some of Marwood's signs to spread hope and goodness in London, and we sent him on his way with our sincere thanks. The children will all remember this day well. A lovely end to the school term. Our thanks to Mrs Walton who arranged the visit with his staff.



A Happy Birthday Ma'am

On the 21st April our Queen will be celebrating her 95th Birthday and will be 2 months into the 70th year of her reign. She never expected this role as her Father, George VI was the second son, but his brother fell in love with an American Divorcee and abdicated the throne. If you have watched The Kings Speech you will have seen that George VI, wasn't a natural speaker, but he stood fast and rallied the country during the war years. The pressure of office no doubt contributed to his early death at just 56.



Elizabeth became Queen on 6th February 1952 at 26 just as she had just started life as a mother. I wonder if anyone ever asked her how she was? She has served a life of duty ever since, travelling far more than any other Monarch, working hard to keep her beloved Commonwealth of Nations together, welcoming many heads of State from other countries with a smile, even though she may not have agreed with them, and shaking hands with Gerry Adams as a sign of friendship and forgiveness to those who were responsible for the killing of her uncle. She has met countless ordinary folk and inspired them and thanked them at many public occasions, usually with her husband the Duke of Edinburgh, now almost 100, by her side. Her reign and life have been marked by her strong Christian Faith and last year she spoke words of encouragement and hope as we faced the pandemic. Seeing Her Majesty knight Sir Tom at Windsor Castle was one of the defining memories of last year.

You would think that after such a long time serving her country that she would be able to enjoy her final years without unnecessary stress. Sadly it has not been so, and instead she has had one of her most stressful years, but has carried it with her customary dignity.

We may never know the whole truth of all that has gone on, but the wisdom of our forebears who advised us not to wash our dirty linen in public is sound advice that her Grandson would have been wise to heed. And if you do wash it very, very, publicly, then you jolly well make sure of your facts first. In 38 years of taking weddings I have yet to meet a Bride and Groom who thought the rehearsal was their actual wedding! Thankfully our Queen and the Royal Family have had the good sense to keep their counsel and not to feed the stories.

I hope and pray that those in America and the media over here learn the value of silence - least said, soonest mended - so that whatever time is left as our Queen may be enjoyable and fulfilling, for if a story deserves a happy ending, then it is of our longest reigning Monarch. Happy Birthday, Ma'am.

The World Day of Prayer



This year it was the turn of Christ Church to host the World Day of Prayer on Friday 5th March. It was decided to hold a Zoom and Facebook service because of current Covid regulations, so it would be a different way of all coming together and this proved to be a real success with over 50 people attending. Thanks are due to Rev. Jane Robson for her technical skills which made the whole venture possible.

The lively service was prepared by the women of Vanuatu on the theme of "Build on a strong Foundation". Vanuatu is an archipelago of 80 islands 2000 miles east of Australia, even Captain Cook traveled there and named the islands the New Hebrides. The islands are an ecological treasure, under threat from global warming and rising sea levels but the diet is full of tropical fruit and vegetables. Life there can be hard, especially for women in that their emancipation in employment and home is slow. Local people are proud of their many different languages and customs, although modern technology is changing lives.

The service flowed well with participants reading dialogues, meditation and prayers. Many thanks to Viv Winterschladen for organising music and singers, who so enhanced the service with their vocal renditions of some lovely lyrics. We could all sing along from the comfort of our own homes.

It was a wonderful feeling knowing that we were part of a meaningful service of praise along with many others all taking part on the same day. Do join us next year on the first Friday in March, hopefully celebrating with each other in person!

ECO CHURCH



In March we received the Good News that we have achieved the **Bronze Eco Church Award** from the international Christian Group A Rocha. This is the result of many years work with a particular emphasis during the past 12 months ... and it continues with families participating in litter picking and joining together with local Climate Action Stokesley & Villages planting trees.

Our **Bronze Eco Church Certificate** will be presented to us by the Green Ambassador for York Diocese, Rev'd Jan Nobel at our 9:30 Morning Praise on Sunday 2nd May.

So, how does Eco Church work?

At the heart of Eco Church is an online survey that enables churches to both record what they are already doing to care for God's earth, and to reflect on what further steps they can take to that end and then act accordingly.



The survey covers all areas of church life: ***Worship and Teaching; Management of Church Buildings and Land; Community and Global Engagement; and Lifestyle***. As such, it challenged us to act in respect of the songs we sing and the prayers we pray; of the energy we use and of the ethics of our investments; of the wildlife that finds a home on our land and of the water that flushes our loos; and so on...

Accompanying the survey is a whole new suite of online resources to help churches undertake the actions recommended in each of the five areas covered by the survey. These include: sermon outlines; youth materials; guides on food co-operatives and looking after church land in wildlife-friendly ways; and a lifestyle audit, to name but a few.

Here are some of the steps that have been taken in the 5 areas covered by the survey:

February 2021: Land Management Plan approved by the PCC following Professional Biodiversity input from Kelly Harmar in **December 2020**

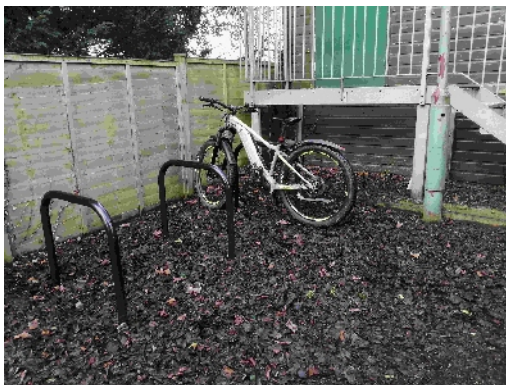
November 2020: Contract for 100% Green electricity to be supplied to our Church and Church Hall by Swalec was approved and signed. We also twinned our Church Hall Toilets as reported in the February edition of Spire.

October 2020: Christ Church registered as an Eco Church and the initial survey was completed by the PCC Eco Church Steering Group which had been formed in **September 2020** with initial membership Geoff Jaques, Helen Land, Ken Taylor and Robin Harmor.

September 2020: "Earth, Water, Wind & Fire" themes for Prayer for the Day during the Season of Creation

February 2020: Bike Racks were installed

The **2018** project to refurbish Christ Church Hall included installing LED lighting; dual flush mechanism toilets and new radiators with thermostatically controlled valves. We installed 100mm insulation as part of the replacement of the Coffee Lounge roof in **2017** and the gas boiler, a Baxi Duo-tec 2 Combi GA range A rated boiler was installed in **2013**.



Much earlier, when Eric Boyce was PCC Secretary, we registered as a Fairtrade Church!

UPDATE ON ROSEBERRY SCHOOL DARJEELING

How I have missed being able to visit Roseberry School since Covid arrived to change everyone's lives! Even though we are blessed with all the joys of modern communications, nothing replaces actually being on the spot, renewing old friendships and seeing how the children have grown and gained confidence. Since the first shutdown began a year ago, we in SAI had every reason to be thankful that the team at Roseberry have sufficient competence and confidence to manage the situation without any input from us. In addition, we are confident that our highly dedicated staff in Darjeeling will never give up on their pupils because they see them all as "family". In practice the teachers have organised home schooling, sending online work for children whose families have mobile phones, and distributing work sheets via parents for those who have no access to Internet or phone. The teachers then mark work returned by parents, which is a crucial part of the process. This system continues for the younger children at Roseberry.



Meanwhile, the Indian government recently decreed that schools open up for 15-18 year olds, attending on alternate days or in batches. However, the needs of primary age children seem to have been forgotten, and government primary schools have remained closed for a whole year. In Darjeeling, the new school year normally starts at the beginning of March, but this year, with no official reopening in sight, our teachers have finally taken matters into their own hands. After meetings with parents, it has been agreed that the oldest pupils (class 4) attend school on 3 morning a week, socially distanced and wearing facemasks. Class 3 attend on the other two days. These little "visitors" to the school do not wear uniform when they come because school is not officially open and they do not wish to draw

attention to what they are doing. Class 2 parents are now asking for their children to attend in batches too.

The teachers report that although the children want to come to school and are responding well, some find it very difficult to concentrate in lessons having come to rely on one to one attention from a parent. Some have forgotten how to behave in class and find it very difficult to sit still for any length of time. Teachers report that pupils have also forgotten much of what they have learnt and are having to be taught the basics from scratch. They have particular problems with speaking and understanding English after so long not using it. Like parents everywhere Roseberry parents are relieved that their children are now getting at least some face to face help from teachers. This is specially important for families where parents have had no education themselves so are unable to help their children. A particular worry is that home schooling magnifies disadvantage instead of improving the prospects of deprived children.

the youngest ones have probably missed the most since the 'work' that can be sent for them online is limited, and last pre-school group have only a few months experience of school. A healthy number of entrants have enrolled for this year's pre-school, but there is no indication of when school will open up for them.



Our Director points out that there have been some positive aspects of lockdown. There have been few cases of Covid in the Darjeeling area and no-one connected with Roseberry School has had the virus. The children are in fact all unusually healthy for this time of year, with no runny noses or fevers. There has been no shortage of food, and the children have not suffered social deprivation because true isolation is impossible when they all live so cheek by jowl. Ration believes that parents have made a massive effort with their children and helped them to the very best of their ability.

Meanwhile, in the town, shops and hotels are all open and the place is full of tourists. It seems that the needs of the tourist industry are given higher priority than children's educational needs.
